EXTRA. IN FOG AND MUD.

The Crowd Could See Nothing but the Finish at Guttenburg. FROM HURDLES TO FLAT. Moisture and Fog Had a Dispiriting Effect on Favorites in the First Two. FLATLANDS WON BY A HEAD. Miss Belle Had an Easy Victory Over Little Fred in the Fourth Race.

GUTTENBURG RACE TRACK, Nov. 4.—The races at Guttenburg today were not witnessed by a large and enthusiastic crowd. On the contrary the few people that were present wondered why they were in attendance. A thick fog hung over the track, making it impossible to see the race with the naked eye, and in some of the races powerful glasses failed to distinguish the colors of the struggling horses.

Enthusiasm under the circumstances was an impossibility, but the crowd made up its mind to bet just the same and take chances that the jockey would give them a good ride. The crowd, however, witnessed the graduation of Flatlands from the maiden class—that is, they saw the flush, and, to their unspeakable relief, Flatlands won. Now, that he is out of the maiden class, he will never worry bettors again, for it may be years before he again wins another race. He was at odds of 3 to 1 today.

Miss Belle was the favorite, but she could not push her way through the fog banks. Her jockey was the good thing in the race. He was backed from 10 to 1 to 4 to 1, and his backers just missed winning by a few inches.

That the moisture had a dispiriting effect on favorites was evident by the fact that the favorite in the second race, Violet S., was unplaced. Van Wart, a 7 to 1 chance, fairly well played, won, while Gladator, an 8 to 1 chance, was second. Cocoa, who has been sold to the Arabian stable, was third. Violet S. was heavily played.

Turk II, an irregular, were up-and-down favorites for the third race. Hugley Penny had his first mount on the former, and he managed to win handily from Miss Bea, a 6 to 1 chance. Irregular was third.
