75,000 FOR CLEVELAND IN NEW YORK.

Big Plurality for the Ex-President in This City.

RETURNS OF THE VOTES.

The Empire City's Indorsement of Its Illustrious Citizen.

REPUBLICANS ARE AMAZED.

Commissioner Gilroy Elected Mayor by a Tremendous Majority.

CLEAN SWEEPS OF THE CITY.

Congressional, Senatorial, Assembly and Aldermanic Winners.

Cleveland and Stevenson have carried the city of New York by about 75,000 plurality. Thomas F. Gilroy has been elected Mayor by substantially the same figures.

The entire Democratic city and county ticket has been elected, with probably twenty-eight of the thirty Assemblymen. All the eight congressmen-elect are Democrats.

The result has been a great surprise to the Republicans, and is a realization of the Democrats' fondest hopes.

The enthusiasm of the crowds in front of the World Building has been unbounded, as the returns have been flashed out.

At 7:45 o'clock the returns from the Twenty-first Assembly District, which has always been considered a Republican stronghold, showed that the District had gone Democratic, electing Hahio, who ran against Simon Hess, by a majority of 1,033.

This is the district in which Jay Gould, Whitelaw Reid, William K. Vanderbilt, Russell Sage, Elliot F. Shepard and others of the silk-stocking Republicans live. It is also the district into which Mr. Cleveland only recently moved.

The Fortieth Election District of the Second Assembly District gave a most surprising return. When the vote was counted it was found that Cleveland had polled 388 votes, while Harrison had to be content with 4.

What made the news more startling was the fact that Timothy "Dry-Dollar" Sullivan resides in this election district.

THE VOTE FOR MAYOR.

The vote for Mayor appears to have been heavy. Returns come in, naturally, slower than on the Presidential ticket. Following is the statement by bulletins:

ILLINOIS FLOPS.

Indications that Cleveland Carries that State. And that Haged Is Elected Governor.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Cleveland and Altgeld will, according to present indications, carry Cook County by 15,000.

It looks now as though Cleveland had carried the State.

Later—Cook County gives Cleveland 20,000 majority, and the State is almost surely Democratic.

There seems at this hour no doubt of the triumphant election of Cleveland and Stevenson.

The Democratic National ticket has retained its hold in the solid South.

In Jersey City the United States election officials did not recognize the Democratic ballots with George B. Fielder, for Congress, as lawful.

Three election officers were arrested by United States marshals early in the day, but United States Commissioner McEwan discharged them without taking their names.

Fielder's Past Conviction.

The ballot law of New Jersey requires that certification of nomination must be filed eight days before the election.

Washington and its four votes are also for Cleveland.

With six votes almost certain in Michigan and with Connecticut giving strong indications of going the Democratic way the demonstration of a glorious triumph of the people's will is most complete.

JERSEY DEMOCRATIC.

Cleveland's Estimated Majority in the State 8,000.

Werts Is Elected Governor Over Kean by 4,000.

Five Congressmen and the Assembly Considered Safe.

It is estimated from returns received at Democratic headquarters at the time this edition of THE EVENING WORLD goes to press that Cleveland has carried the State of New Jersey by at least 8,000 majority.

The complete New Jersey returns are late owing to the fact that the polls did not close until 7 P. M.

Democrat's claim the election of Werts for Governor by about 4,000.

Trenton, Nov. 8.—At the Democratic Headquarters in this city it is claimed the Democrats have elected five out of the eight Congressmen.

It is also claimed that four out of the eight Senators elected are Democrats.

The leaders also claim that a safe Democratic majority has been elected to the Assembly.

John Kean Jr., for Governor, ran ahead of Harrison in many of the districts. Werts, Democrat, for Governor, has probably carried the State by a reduced majority.

Throughout the State the voters of both parties as a rule voted the head of their ticket straight, but on the Governor and other contests the vote was mixed and very confusing.

The Reading Combine bill was an important factor in the election, and in the different sections the local influences counted for more than party fealty.

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27,000 FOR GROVER IN KINGS.

And the Democracy Gains a Congressman There.

CITY TICKET ELECTED.

Fifteen of the Eighteen Assemblymen Chosen Are Democrats.

GROVER WINS QUEENS BY 2,500

And Patrick J. Gleason Is Re-elected Mayor of Long Island City.

SUFFOLK IS FOR HARRISON.

The Republicans Increased Their Majority There by 200 Only.

The indications at 11 P. M., were that Cleveland had carried Kings County by 27,000.

The Democrats have also carried fourteen and possibly fifteen of the eighteen Assembly Districts.

The whole of the Democratic city and county tickets have been elected by good majorities.

Secretary William A. Furey, of the Kings County Campaign Committee, says Cleveland's plurality in the County will be over 25,000.

Six hundred election districts out of 648 give Cleveland 91,315; Harrison, 93,541. Cleveland's majority, 2,226.

At 10:30 the Republicans conceded Kings County by 25,000 majority.

The Twenty-seventh Ward was the first to send in its returns completed, which showed, for Cleveland, 2,823; Harrison, 1,704.

This was followed by the ever reliable Fourteenth Ward, which gave the Democratic ticket a plurality of 2,700—Cleveland, 3,800; Harrison, 1,100.

NEW YORK STATE IS O. K.

Cleveland Carries It by from 25,000 to 30,000 Plurality.

STRONG IN THE COUNTRY

While the Republicans Show Losses Even in Their Best Strongholds.

MR. PLATT'S TOWN IS SOLID.

Harrison Loses 300 in Livingston County and 400 in Saratoga County.

Cleveland has carried New York State. His plurality will run, as at present indicated, from 25,000 to 30,000.

The splendid Democratic increase in New York and Kings County is echoed to a general extent by Democratic gains in the State at large.

Where both sides lose in the county districts, it is almost invariably the Republicans, who lose the most votes.

Lyons, Wayne County.—Complete returns showed a Democratic gain of 107.

In 1888 Malena gave Cleveland 764; Harrison, 1,327. Republican gain, 563.

In Livingston County Harrison loses 300 on his plurality.

Geneva, Ontario County, complete, gives Harrison 15 majority, a Democratic gain of 51.

A general bulletin at 8:05 said: Fifty-two districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 5,390; Harrison, 7,623.

The same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 5,700; Harrison, 8,100. Republican net loss, 213.

Utica 600 for Cleveland.

An 8 o'clock bulletin said the city of Utica would probably give Cleveland 500 majority. This beats Gov. Flower's vote last year.

Harrison carried Utica by 30 majority in '88.

8:15—Buffalo—41 election districts out of 128, give Cleveland 7,782; Harrison, 8,726. A Democratic loss.

8:15—92 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 14,942; Harrison, 18,437.

The same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 10,585 and Harrison 14,362.

8:25—113 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn, give Cleveland 11,092; Harrison, 16,454.

The same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 13,091; Harrison, 17,622.

8:40—129 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 14,942; Harrison, 18,437.

The same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 15,325; Harrison, 19,925.

8:45—183 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland, 29,500; Harrison, 25,740.

The same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 21,000; Harrison, 27,410; Republican net loss 273.

8:50—Platt's Town.

Oswego, Toga County, Mr. Platt's town, with one district to hear from, gives Cleveland 800; Harrison, 1,255.

In 1888 the twelve districts in the town gave Cleveland 1,145; Harrison, 1,401.

At the Home of Hill and Fassett.

Elmira city complete, which is the center of the tobacco growers and the home of Senator Hill and Mr. Fassett, gives Harrison, 3,273; Cleveland, 2,688.

In 1888 the vote was: Cleveland, 3,541; Harrison, 3,933.

Harrison's Loss in Four Republican Counties.

Despatches received at the headquarters of the Democratic National Committee at 8:15 stated that Chautauque, Livingston, St. Lawrence and Saratoga Counties four Republican strongholds of the State, showed a Republican loss of 2,000 compared with the vote last year for Fassett.

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
