M'GUIRE'S AWFUL CRIME.

The Murderer's Own Story of the Killing of Mrs. Gregory. The crime for which Fred McGuire suffered the extreme penalty of the law was one of the most brutal murders ever committed in Orange County.

When summoned by Warden McGuire he had just finished a prayer in his cell. He was in his trousers and shirt sleeves, wearing the slippers which he had used from the time he entered the condemned cell.

Without stopping to put on a collar and necktie, Fred McGuire stepped into the chair. The body of McGuire was strapped to the chair in a few seconds. The electrodes were attached to the top of his head and the calf of his leg.

Electrician Davis pulled down the lever, which sent the deadly current through the body of the man in the chair at a rate of 1,000 volts. The body of McGuire was not stirred a muscle or showed the least sign of the fear of death, shot up as though he were dead.

The hands clinched, the straps creaked and the body strained as though it would burst the bonds. There was a sharp crack and the body settled back in the chair.
