MONEY FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Board of Estimate Appropriates Over Four Millions.

Mayor Grant Wants to Abandon the Schoolship St. Mary's.

More than \$4,000,000 was appropriated for the public schools by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment today.

The item for salaries of teachers in primary and grammar schools was \$3,123,050, or \$2,430 more than for 1892.

There are twelve new schools to be provided for in 1893.

There has been an increase in attendance of 4,000 pupils within the last year, and the Board of Estimate has to take account of this increase.

The Board allowed \$150,000 for evening schools, \$75,000 more than was granted for 1892.

TREASURER HOPPER ACCUSED.

Janitor Kearney Says He Was Assaulted with a Knife.

Hopper Alleges That It is an Attempt at Blackmail.

George F. Hopper, Treasurer of Harry Miner's Eighth Avenue Theatre, is accused of assaulting Janitor Kearney, the janitor of the flat-house 318 West Fifteenth street, with a knife.

A warrant for Hopper's arrest was sworn out in Jefferson Market Police Court Monday afternoon, and Tuesday Hopper went to the court and gave himself up. He was paroled upon his own recognizance until this morning.

When the case was called Hopper reported ready for examination, but the complainant declared that he had been unable to secure his witnesses, and at his request the examination was put over until next Monday afternoon.

Kearney is twenty-eight years old and dresses very fashionably. He was very reticent concerning the circumstances which led up to the alleged assault, declaring that he could substantiate the allegations made in his affidavit, and that he did not propose to make any statement until he had spoken to his attorney.

Hopper is a tall man, with a rather consumptive appearance, but Hopper is large, heavily proportioned and muscular.
