GOODRICH'S LAST KNOCKOUT.

He Falls on His Neck Dodging a Blow and Is Instantly Killed.

Fatal Ending of His Fight with Joe Green at New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 4.—George Goodrich, a colored middle-weight, was instantly killed in the ring last night by his opponent, Joe Green.

It was long after midnight. The fight was one of a series given in Duffy's arena, under the direction of the celebrated referee.

In the second round of the fight Goodrich ducked a blow and slipped on the bloody stage.

He fell first on his groin, then on his neck, and died instantly. The man failed from Louisville.
