

LAST EDITION. OLD CAPT. M'CULLAGH.

Death of the Veteran Policeman in His Station-House. He Had Been Ill Only a Week with Quinsy.

For Over Twenty Years He Was a Precinct Commander.

Police Capt. John H. McCullagh, of the Twenty-first Precinct, died at 5:30 o'clock this morning in his room at the station-house in Broadway street, near Third avenue.



Dr. Manheim would permit him to be removed to his home, as he regarded his condition as too serious. Yesterday the captain was believed to be improving.

About 2 o'clock this morning he took a ride to St. Sergt. Hatton, who was on desk duty, to send for a physician. Dr. Manheim was telegraphed for, as well as Dr. Fleurer, Dr. Fleurer and Prof. Phillips. They responded promptly, and found Capt. McCullagh in danger of choking to death.

The operation of tracheotomy was resorted to. Dr. Fleurer performed the operation, but it afforded the captain no relief. Everything possible was done, but the captain breathed his last at 5:30 o'clock.

His nephew, Capt. John McCullagh, of the Eighth Precinct, who had been summoned, was present at his bedside, with Ward Detective William Fraser, who had been sitting up with the captain ever since he became ill. Capt. McCullagh's wife, who was at Irvington-on-the-Hudson, was telegraphed for, but did not arrive in time to see her husband before he died.

Two minutes after the captain's death took place Sgt. Hatton telegraphed the fact to Headquarters. Very few of the men who sleep in the station-house were aware of the captain's death. They hurried out at 6 o'clock this morning, when the sergeant in command informed them and made a few words to the most athletic men on the force, and appeared to be in good health.

He had been on the force nearly thirty years, a captain for eleven years, and he lived and continued on the force another year he would have added the sixth gold stripe to his cap.

He was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1842, and came to this country with his parents when he was eleven years old. His parents went to live at Irvington-on-the-Hudson, before he went on the police force. He was in the employ of Cornelius Vanderbilt.

When Capt. McCullagh became a policeman, he was barely a month past his majority, but he began to make his record almost immediately. He was noted as one of the most athletic men on the force, and was especially neat of foot.

HIS NEW AFFIDAVITS.

Carlyle Harris's Counsel Fighting Hard for His Life. The District-Attorney Destroys the Value of Some Testimony.

Howe on the other in another trial over Carlyle W. LAST EDITION. IS NARONIC AFLOAT?

No News Yet of the Big White Star Freighter. Sailors Think Retribution Has Overtaken Capt. Roberts.

He Commanded the Adriatic and Refused to Aid the City of Paris. The fate of the big freight carrier Naronic is still a mystery, and as the days go by without any news from her the belief that she has gone to the bottom gains more adherents in shipping circles.

Two vessels arrived from European ports today, the Servia from Liverpool and the French liner La Bretagne from Havre. The report got about that the Servia had sighted the missing White Star ship, but this proved to be false. The Cunard vessel did sight a big White Star line freighter, but she was the Konic, from Liverpool for New York, a sister ship to the missing Naronic.

At the offices of the White Star line it is still believed that the Naronic has met with an accident, and that she will eventually turn up all right. A gleam of hope is afforded in the fact that three other vessels, the Servia, the Italy, and the Aislaia, from Mediterranean ports, are some days overdue, and there is a possibility that they may be towing the Naronic.

Again, the Naronic may have made for the Azores, and a communication with those islands is very irregular. It is not thought likely that her safe arrival there could have been reported, as she would not be likely to be reported as advanced to-day by any experienced seaman. The Naronic is the only ship which has not been reported as having followed a southerly course.

The idea most favored is that the Naronic has met with a mishap similar to that which befell the Servia, and that she is now in the hands of some pirates, who are inclined to accept it as the correct solution of the mystery. The Naronic has met with an accident to her masted, and only beyond control, drifting north towards Greenland. The masted masted, who are treated as some time, would certainly drive her in this direction if not opposed by contrary power.
