OXFORD THE WINNER.

LONDON, March 22.—The great English 'Varsity boat race, four miles over the Putney-Mortlake course, has just been decided.

The tide was running strongly and there was a slight wind. The boats started at 4.55 P.M.

Oxford won the race by half a length from Cambridge.

The work of selecting a jury for the trial of Dr. Robert W. Buchanan, charged with wife poisoning, was resumed before Recorder Smyth in Part III. of the Court of General Sessions this morning.

Dr. Buchanan, who is a pleasant speaker, declined to discuss his case, at the same time disdaining any discursive pleas.

The collapse at 11:30 o'clock this forenoon of a brick-walled arch in the foundation of the old Globe Hotel building, at 64, 66 and 68 Broadway, now being demolished to make room for the new Manhattan Life Insurance Company, buried two laborers beneath the debris, and they narrowly escaped death.
