

HULL STRIKERS LOSE GROUND. 2,000 Non-Union Men at Work Under Protection of the Police.

LONDON, April 11.—The situation in Hull today is quite gloomy for the strikers, and to judge from present indications the Shipping Federation will win in its struggle to employ such men, union or non-union, as its members please.

Four hundred additional non-union men arrived in Hull today to take the places of unionists, and were at once placed at work. There are now altogether 2,000 non-unionists at work on the docks, and it is thought that no assaults will be made upon them as they are protected by dragons and policemen.

This morning, as a train conveying a number of the "blacklegs," as the strikers term them, was entering the town, it was stopped by a number of men who had encircled themselves along the railway embankment. Beyond the smoking of the whistles of the coaches no damage was done. When the train had passed the mob dispersed, and when the police arrived on the scene the line was deserted.

The firms in Hull engaged in the timber-carrying trade, who, since the beginning of the strike, have left their vessels receiving the cargoes, resume work at once other men will be engaged to fill their places.

The members of the Shipping Federation express themselves as confident of beating the strikers. The riotous acts of the latter have done much to deprive popular opinion of sympathy for the strikers, and any further attempt at rioting will be promptly suppressed by the police and military.

Joseph Havelock Wilson, President of the Sailors and Firemen's Union, arrived at Cardiff today with the object of enlisting the dock laborers there in support of the Hull strikers.

With his great influence in labor circles, there is scarcely a doubt that he will obtain material aid, not only in Cardiff, but in other ports which he intends to visit.

There is every indication that the shipping trade of Cardiff is about to become involved in a struggle with the Sailors and Firemen's Union. The members of the Union have demanded an increase in their wages to begin to-day, and they threaten to block the sailing of every vessel, the owners of which do not comply with their demands.

ELLIOTT F. SHEPARD'S WILL. It Disposes of \$1,350,000 Worth of Real and Personal Property.

The will of Col. Elliott F. Shepard, the late proprietor of the Mail and Express, was filed with the Surrogate of the Surrogate's office at 1 o'clock this afternoon by lawyer William Irving.

The will covers the pages of footstep, was made July 15, 1891, and was witnessed by Mrs. Julia, Robert C. Alexander and James Sinclair.

According to the sworn inventory accompanying the will, the estate is valued at \$1,350,000, of which \$800,000 is in real estate and \$550,000 in personal property.

The estate is to be divided into a fund which is for the benefit of the testator's wife, children and his brother, Augustus D. Shepard, who are all three deceased.

Mrs. Shepard, Augustus D. Shepard and young Irving, who had been named as executors, and in the event of their deaths the Union Trust company is named as their successors.

According to the will Mrs. Margaret Louisa Vanderbilt Shepard is to receive the residue of the real property and the use for life of his household articles of furniture, works of art, plate, silver, table furniture, and household carriage.

Augustus D. Shepard received \$100,000 in cash from the trustees of the New York Proviso, two bequests of \$100,000 and \$50,000 respectively, made by St. Paul's Institute at London, and \$100,000 and \$100,000, and Margaret D., Augustus D. and Elliott F. Shepard, in various methods, are to receive \$100,000 of the residue.

Mrs. Margaret L. V. Shepard and Augustus D. Shepard are to receive the residue of the estate, after the payment of the debts, and the interest of the fund is to be divided among them in the following proportions: Mrs. Shepard, one-third; Augustus D. Shepard, one-third; and Elliott F. Shepard, one-third.

HARRIS'S CASE PRESENTED. Lawyer Howe Has a Private Audience with Gov. Flower.

ALBANY, April 11.—William F. Howe, of New York City, counsel for Carlisle W. Harris, was given a private audience by Gov. Flower this morning.

Mr. Howe argued that the testimony of Mrs. Potts was unreliable, and that sufficient evidence had been produced to show that Harris was innocent.

He also called the Governor's attention to the petition filed yesterday which he said contained 4,000 signatures, among them the names of Clarence Seward, Judge Boies, Judge, Edgar Johnson, Robert L. Cutler, and other distinguished citizens.

Mr. Howe also laid eleven letters from prominent people favoring a commutation of the sentence.

He called the Governor's attention to a complete analysis of the case made by John H. Howland, President of the New York City Board of Education, himself an eminent chemist.

After Mr. Howe had left Gov. Flower said he could not tell how soon he would be able to reach a decision.

At 11 o'clock this morning, Harris, the condemned wife-murderer, did not sleep well last night on account of the terrible suspense in which he is kept, and whether he shall live after the week of May 8, the time set for his execution.

Harris requested an late reading and writing. He looked as though he had spent a wakeful night when he greeted Chief Keeper Connaughton this morning.

DR. BARLOW'S WIFE IN COURT. She Brings Suit to Dispossess Her Husband from Their Home.

The locked-out garment-cutters' battle with the Clothing Manufacturers' Association is still on. There is no sign yet that either side will yield.

"Instead of ordering a general strike of tailors, as was originally contemplated," said Secretary Harry White, of the locked-out cutters, this morning, "the contractors and tailors will devise some more specific means of assisting us now at the same time, and advance their own interests. They will present all firms with a schedule of uniform hours, wages and better conditions generally. There is no doubt that when their plan is matured it will bring about results even more favorable than could be obtained by a strike, which would cripple the whole trade."

"As for suing Vice-President Mendelson, of the Manufacturers' Association," continued Secretary White, "we don't exactly know how to go about it. The others, who have been sued for \$25,000 damages for locking-out their cutters, were all indubitable members of their respective firms. Mr. Mendelson, however, occupies a seemingly undeniably position. He is not so far as we can ascertain, a partner in any of the firms, and yet he is the Vice-President of them all."

The locked-out men have changed their intention, and have decided to present a petition to the Mayor for the removal of President Horsthal, of the Association, from his office.

They have now resolved to get up a number of resolutions, and to present them to the Nineteenth Ward school children and to have it presented to the Mayor by a committee of prominent politicians.

Mr. Mendelson, of the Association, says that the aggressive steps threatened by the locked-out men, if carried out, would be a serious blow to the industry.

These spasmodic alarms about strikes, arrests and other matters, however, are all men like General Secretary Reichers, who have everything to gain by keeping the cutters in a state of uncertainty.

Leo Kaufman, the manufacturer who was said to have signed his intention of withdrawing from the Association, was seen this morning, but refused to say anything.
