FROM THE WORLD OF LABOR

The Jewellers' Union has organized two shops this week. Blacksmiths and wheelwrights will be organized at the Labor Lyceum in Philadelphia.

At the last regular meeting of the newly organized Waist and Wrapper-Makers' Union, twenty-two new members were admitted.

The Executive Board of the Bookbinders' Advance Association is busily engaged in reorganizing several large branches in Philadelphia and vicinity.

Plumbers, steamfitters, painters, varnishers and cabinet-makers are on strike on the job of Harry, Reynolds & Co., who have refused to employ union men.

Marble polishers and bed-rubbers have been locked out in Cincinnati. The bosses are on strike last year's strike.

At yesterday's session the Ploomers' Union adopted resolutions regarding the apprenticeship system, making four years the time of apprenticeship, and adopting a union label.

Cabinet-makers' Union No. 7 rejected a candidate yesterday who refused to pay initiation fee of \$50 imposed upon him for the purpose of organizing a branch of the union.

Three hundred bricklayers are out in New York City. In an advance of 50 cents, the bosses say they are unanimous in their refusal not to make terms with the strikers.

From General Secretary George L. DeLoach, it appears that the International Union of Journeymen Bakers and Amalgamated International Union of Steamfitters and Engine Drivers are in a state of collapse.

Mayor Mosby and Chief of Police DeLoach have announced their intention to enforce a new ordinance of barber shops in this city, according to the law.

A special meeting has been called by the Silk Ribbon Weavers' Union for next Wednesday at the West Side Labor Lyceum.

Resolutions against the lumping system were adopted at yesterday's meeting of the carpenters in Webster Hall, which was held on Monday.

The trunk line Presidents and general managers are to meet again this afternoon at the Missouri, Kansas and Texas road.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 12.—The Executive Committee of the Republican National League adjourned at 10 o'clock last night.

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HOUSE AND HOME

Graham Flour. The traditional method of handling Graham flour is to sift out the bran, pick from it the nuts, sticks, etc., then return about half the bran to the flour to be used for bread making.

One of the best things to cleanse the scalp throughout is to dissolve one-half teaspoon of California borax in a quart of water and apply it, rubbing it in well.

Muffin rings can be used for baking Graham gems, but heavy iron gem pans are much better than either muffin rings or tin pans for baking all kinds of gems.
