

FOUND DEAD ON THE BED.

Did Minville Turn on the Gas Accidentally or Deliberately?

He Was About to Sail for His Home in France.

Arnald Minville, a native of France, forty-five years old, was found dead this morning in his room in Dr. G. W. Elliott's private boarding-house, at 153 West Fourteenth street, asphyxiated by illuminating gas.

When discovered Mr. Minville was dozing, and lying on the outside of the bed. A gas burner was turned on full heat.

It is a question whether the man committed suicide or accidentally turned on the gas. He may possibly have blown out the flame unintentionally when he retired.

The fact that the dead man intended to sail for Havre to-day and had made all preparations for the voyage would indicate accidental death.

The first seen of Minville at the Fourteenth street boarding-house was yesterday afternoon, when a hotel proprietor across the street introduced him to Dr. Elliott, and stated that the Frenchman wanted a room for one night in a quiet place.

The stranger seemed troubled with a slight difficulty in his stomach, and appeared to be quite nervous. He had been in the city for about two years.

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NATHAN HAS A NEW SCHEME.

He Will Have an Organization of His Own.

Its Power, It is Said, Will Be Thrown to the Democrats.

The Republicans in Brooklyn, who have worked hard to perfect the plans for reorganizing the party in Kings County, were not surprised this morning when it became known that Nathan, who had openly declared his opposition to the plans, had adopted new tactics for enlarging his independent party.

Nathan's scheme is to form a new organization and throw all his power with the Democrats next Fall.

When the district associations organize their Ward Committees, and elect delegates to the Central Committee, the Nathanites, it is said, will demand seats. They will claim the privilege on the ground that, as members of the defunct General Committee, they paid their dues, which have never been repaid.

Their argument will be ignored. Then, it is said, Nathan will show his hand. The case will be taken to the courts, and a demand made for their rights on the assumption of a contract.

This morning Thiele, Farrell and Greenwood were held in the Harlem Police Court in \$1,000 bail each by Justice Burke.

Schaefer, a saloon-keeper, at 208 West Ninety-eighth street, testified that he had seen Thiele grab Ross, who was riding down and batter his head against the sidewalk until Ross was insensible. Thiele was arrested by three other boys.

The police believe that in arresting Thiele, Farrell and Greenwood they have captured part of the gang that recently made a bicycle ride with a number of boys, state that they have been robbed by a gang of young men, who overpowered their number and take away all their valuables.

George N. Buchanan, the well-known active Republican in South Brooklyn, has resigned from the party and applied for membership in the ward Democratic Association.

Mr. Buchanan says he has grown tired of the inconsistency of the men who run the Republican party.

Police Commissioner Walsh, of the West Thirtieth street station, was called in and he took charge of the house. The dead man's effects were sent to the station-house. They consisted of a trunk, value, thirty-five pieces of gold, French denomination, two banknotes of the same country and \$16 in United States currency.

Among other effects there were a diamond ring, lady's small open-faced watch, a full metal thirty-caliber revolver and a memorandum-book. These were sent to the coroner's office this morning.

It is said that Minville is not the real name of the dead man, but that he is a very wealthy man, who has been driven from Cuba on account of some peculiar state of affairs there.

He has two sons in France, it is said, and is thought to be a widower. His appearance and dress generally indicated that he was, or had been, a man of the higher walk of life.

EMMA PANZER'S DEATH. She is Reported to Have Taken Carbolic Acid.

The coroner's office was notified today of the suspicious death of Emma Panzer, the nineteen-year-old daughter of John Panzer, a harness-maker at 24 Cherry street.

Dr. Siff, of 164 Madison street, called at the Madison street police station last night and reported that the girl had taken carbolic acid, and would probably die. This morning the police were notified that Emma died at 6 A. M.

Mr. Panzer would not state this forenoon whether his daughter had taken poison deliberately or not. He called at the Madison street police station last night complaining of annoyance from inquirers, and asked the Sergeant for protection.

To the policeman detailed at the house Mr. Panzer said that Emma died from natural causes. He is inconsolable and refuses to see anybody.

The janitor at 24 Cherry street said to-day that she saw Emma Panzer on the street last evening at 5 o'clock, and that she saw the girl was then in perfect health.

Emma, the janitress said, was the youngest of five children, and always lived at home attending to housework.

Panzer has a harness store on the ground floor of the house. Among his neighbors the family are known as industrious Germans, who mingled little with other tenants of the flat.

Dr. Siff stated that he was hastily summoned at about 9:30 o'clock last night to attend the girl. He found her in a fainting state of coma. He was told she had taken the poison only a few minutes before his arrival. Half a dozen women, seated at the table in the room, and they explained that she had taken a dose of carbolic acid by mistake.

Dr. Siff administered antidotes, but they had no effect on the patient, who was then taken to the hospital.

The doctor asked that an ambulance be summoned, but the family, he says, emphatically refused to allow the girl to be taken to the hospital, and she died.

The doctor said that the girl was in a large one as to almost immediately produce a profound state of coma.

"The doctor said that he was asked for the bottle from which she took the poison, but it was not produced, and when the girl's mother asked for a death certificate he refused it and notified the police.

The police are of the opinion that the girl was suffering from toothache and used carbolic acid, thinking it was croton, and accidentally swallowed some of the poison.

Dr. Siff thinks the dose of poison was larger than the girl could take in this manner.

BOY HIGHWAYMEN CAUGHT.

Robbed a Peddler and Left Him Insensible on the Street.

Believed to Be Part of the Gang Who Rob Cyclists in the Park.

Three boys were arraigned before Justice Burke in the Harlem Police Court to-day on a charge of highway robbery and assault.

Harris Ross, a peddler, of 224 First avenue, was attacked the other day on Ninety-eighth street, between the Boulevard and Tenth avenue, by four boys, who knocked him down, beat him until he was insensible and then robbed him of \$1.75, all the money he had in his possession.

Detectives Watt and Kane, of the West One Hundredth street station, early this morning arrested Herman Thiele, aged eighteen, of 74 Columbia avenue, an one of Ross's assailants. Thiele, confessed, and named George Farrell, aged sixteen, of 759 Columbus avenue; James Greenwood, aged seventeen, of 69 Amsterdam avenue; and Mickey Hogan, address unknown, and his accomplices, Farrell and Greenwood.
