Granted a Divorce from "Willie" Wilde This Morning.

The Evidence in the Case Not Made Public.

She May Marry Again, but He Is Forbidden to Do So.

NEWBURG, N. Y., June 10.—At 9:05 this morning Judge C. F. Brown announced to an "Evening World" representative that he had just signed a divorce decree for Mrs. Leslie Wilde from her husband, "Willie" Wilde, and transferred it to M. H. Harschberg, attorney for Mrs. Leslie.

The evidence in the case will not be made public, neither will the complaint or answer.

Mrs. Frank Leslie and William C. Kimpbury Wilde, M. A., of London, eldest son of the late Sir William Wilde, M. D., of Dublin, and the once-aesthetic Oscar Wilde, were married late on the evening of Oct. 4, 1881, at St. George's Church, in the Strand, London.

The announcement of the wedding caused quite a flutter, and Mrs. Leslie Wilde, in telling how it happened that she made up her mind inside of two days to marry him, said it was because she loved him for his mother.

"Lady Wilde is so charming," the blushing bride said, "that it had a great deal to do with my marrying her son. I have tried to profit by her acquaintance, and hope some day to be in New York what she is in London."

Mrs. Leslie Wilde is a woman of a different mind, and it was not a great while before rumors of mild disagreements were heard.

After the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Wilde drove to Belmont, and had an informal wedding supper. Mrs. Leslie Wilde returned to her apartments at the Marlborough at 10:30 P. M. according to the clerk, who did not know she had been in the city.

IN THE BORDEN CASE. Policeman Denied Admission to the House in Fall River.

All the Officers on the Case but Mully Have Been Promoted. NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 10.—There was less of a rush this morning than there has been yet for the Borden trial, the morning opening warm and muggy, and the uncomfortable condition of the court-room being too little attractive, in view of past experiences, to offset the drawing powers of commonplace evidence.

TROOPS SENT TO LEMONT. Two Chicago Regiments Ordered Against the Strikers.

Thirty of the Rioters Captured and Sent to Joliet.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 10.—Gov. Altgeld had not received any word from the sheriff of Cook county at a late hour last night, but fearing a further outbreak at Lemont he ordered Adj.-Gen. Orendorf to go at once to the scene of action, and telegrams were sent calling out the second and third regiments to repair at once to Lemont and Joliet to-day morning. He at once went with the second regiment, which is composed of Chicago companies, and they can get to Lemont in a few hours. The third regiment was ordered to proceed to Joliet, streator and surrounding towns.

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THE PLAGUE'S MARCH. Cholera Shows Itself at Narbonne, in France.

Seven Deaths from the Disease at Mecca Yesterday.

Leaves of Absence to Fort Physicists at London Revoked.

PARIS, June 10.—Cholera has shown itself at Narbonne, in the Department of Aude, on the railway from Bordeaux to Cette, and having communication with the Mediterranean through the Canal of Narbonne, which traverses the town. Dr. Mecler, of the Narbonne Hospital, has died of a disease which is pronounced to be cholera.

ALEXANDRIA, June 10.—The number of deaths from cholera in Mecca yesterday was seventy, indicating that the disease is on the increase.

LONDON, June 10.—President H. H. Fowler, of the Local Government Board, has cancelled the Summer leave granted to the medical men attached to the Local Government Board, and has ordered an increasing watch kept at all British ports against the entrance of cholera and other diseases until the end of September.

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
