

THAT ORDER SIGNED.
MAHER'S HURT WAS FATAL.
But the Minutes Are Not Yet Ready for Publication.

Fractured His Skull While Boarding a Trolley Car.

May Newcomb, Too, May Die from Being Thrown into the Street.

The body of William Maher, who died from injuries received by falling from a trolley car in Brooklyn, was taken from the Seney Hospital to the home of his family, 8 Post place, Flatbush, this morning. Maher died from a fractured skull late last night.

On the evening of July 9 Maher attempted to board a trolley car at the Park plaza. The car was coming at full speed around the circle. Maher's foot slipped, and he was dashed to the ground, striking on his head.

He was picked up with a deep cut in the back of his skull, and Ambulance Surgeon Spence, of the Seney Hospital, attended to Maher's injuries, and after sending him home with several stitches in his head reported that he had merely sustained a scalp wound. Later the family physician pronounced Maher to be suffering from a fracture of the skull, and he was removed from his home to the Seney Hospital. Maher became crazed from his hurts and it required the combined strength of six men to put him in a strait jacket in order that he might be removed to the hospital.

Surgeon Spence, in excusing himself from making a wrong diagnosis of Maher's injuries, stated that he was soiled and he could not work on Maher's injuries properly.

Maher was employed as fireman at the power house of the Brooklyn and New York Island Railroad Company at Kings Highway. He was a widow and three young children.

As a result of another trolley accident, the body of a young girl, lying at the home of his parents, 253 West 43rd street, Brooklyn, suffering from internal injuries, is recovering doubtfully.

The boy was sitting on the front seat of a trolley car No. 417, the Greene and Gates avenue line last night. While the car was bowling along the latter brought down a heavy stone on the head of the child, striking her on the forehead and causing a severe shock, and all were more or less bruised.

The little boy, Newcomb, was thrown into the street by a trolley car. He was picked up by a passer-by, who was bleeding copiously from the nose and mouth, several teeth were missing, and was severely cut about the face and head.

He was taken home in an ambulance in a semi-conscious condition.

FUNERAL OF EDWARD B. CADLEY.
Brooklyn Supervisors Pass Resolutions and Attend in a Body.

The Board of Supervisors called a special meeting at the Court-House in Brooklyn soon after noon today and passed resolutions expressing regret for the death of the late Edward B. Cadley, and offering condolence to the bereaved family.

The Supervisors afterwards left in a body for the funeral services at St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church, at Kings Highway, where the interment takes place in Holy Cross Cemetery at Flatbush.

BEAT HER CHILD INSENSIBLE.
Widow Joyce Arrested on the Charge of Extreme Cruelty.

Agent Sauer, of the Children's Society, was called upon in the Len Avenue court today to investigate an alleged case of extreme cruelty.

Henry Waddell, of 374 Grand street, says that he was called by the woman, who has a five-year-old child into insensibility. The woman, according to Waddell, had been drinking and had temporarily removed the baby from the custody of the mother.

FOOT CRUSHED BY A TRAIN.
Fred Collins, of This City, Hurt in Portchester.

PORTCHESTER, N. Y., July 19.—Frederick Collins, a New Yorker, who is boarding for the summer at this place, while attempting to get aboard of a train this morning, had his left foot crushed under the wheels. He was carried to the hospital, where the foot may have to be amputated.

WILLIE GUILLE'S BODY BACK.
Brought for Burial from Patchoque Where He Was Drowned.

The body of Willie Guille, aged twelve, son of William Guille, of 474 Franklin street, Brooklyn, was brought to Brooklyn from Patchoque, L. I., to-day.

The boy was drowned at Patchoque yesterday. He was out bicycling with some friends, and fell into the water in the Patchoque River. He was seized with cramps, and was drowned before his friends could reach him.

BOY BURGLARS HELD.
They Broke Into a Store and Stole \$18 Worth of Tools.

Two fourteen-year-old boys, Charles Holshoe, of 18 Park street, and Charles Neumann, of 100 West 12th street, Williamsburg, were held for examination in the Len Avenue Court today on the charge of burglary.

Last night the boys broke into the carpenter shop of George W. Stutzman, and 13 Jefferson street, and took away tools valued at \$18.

YELLOW JACK ABOARD.
Bark Alice Reed Lost Both Her Mates on Yellow Fever.

LEWES, Del., July 19.—The American bark Alice Reed, from Georgetown, loaded with sugar, arrived at the Delaware Breakwater last night. Both mates had yellow fever on the bark, one died and was buried at sea. The vessel is quarantined and will be fumigated.

Abandoned Schooner Sighted.
The steamer Yumuri, which sailed from Vera Cruz for this port on July 4, arrived here this morning and reported passing at 10 o'clock on the morning of July 7 the abandoned schooner Robert P. Chandler, of New York, in latitude 23, longitude 78.18.

The schooner was waterlogged and had been boarded and stripped. She is in the tracks of northbound vessels.

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DU BOISE AN OLD OFFENDER.
Record of the Man Under Arrest for Blackmail in Brooklyn.

Twice Sentenced to Prison and Pardoned by Gov. Flower.

John Du Boise, confined in the Raymond Street Jail, Brooklyn, to await the action of the Grand Jury for a full term of six months, which he said was to be used as hush money for the Brooklyn police before she could open a cheap lodging-house, proves to be a notorious criminal, who has had an interesting career.

Ever since Du Boise was committed by Justice Walsh, Capt. Eason's detectives have been watching up the man's record, and this morning Serg. Marry made his report to Chief Campbell.

It shows that in 1876 Du Boise was arrested in New York, charged with trying to blackmail Cortland St. John, of 29 Cedar street, out of several thousand dollars. The gambler was sentenced by Justice Gildersteele to three and a half years in Sing Sing.

The road extends from Fulton street near Atlantic avenue, to Jamaica, and the laws of 1883 provided for its purchase by the city.

THREE TOOK THEIR LIVES.
James Martin Hanged Himself in Bellevue Hospital.

Mr. Moses and Butcher Schindler Cut Their Throats.

James Martin, thirty-seven years old, a laborer, who has been committed to the almshouse at Bellevue Hospital since Monday last, committed suicide in his cell this morning.

The man had been so violent that it was found necessary to tie him to his bed. Putting the absence of the nurse he got up and managed to get himself into the window in the cell, he tied one around his neck and hanged himself. He was dead ten minutes after he was discovered. The body was sent to the Morgue.

Mr. Moses and Butcher Schindler Cut Their Throats.
Mrs. Pauline Moses, forty-three years old, who was yesterday brought down from the insane asylum on Ward's Island, where she had been some time confined, committed suicide at her home, 4 Hamilton street, shortly before 10 o'clock by cutting her throat with a razor.

The woman was apparently in good spirits this morning and worked in the kitchen of her apartments.
