

IS GEN. HAMILTON INSANE?

Mrs. Freeman Denies He Is Her Dup. Says She Travelled with Him at the Advice of Physicians.

Gen. Alexander Hamilton, the eldest of the eleven children of John C. Hamilton, the grandson of Alexander Hamilton, the first Secretary of the Treasury, brother of Gen. Schuyler Hamilton, who lives at the Hotel Savoy, uncle of the late Robert Hamilton and one of the participants in the great estate of the founder of the family, is, in his seventy-eighth year, the subject of an application for a commission in lunacy, signed by the wife of his old age, Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Bodine Hamilton, and granted by Justice Dykman, of the Supreme Court, sitting in Westchester County, where the venerable old general has lived all his life.

CHANGE IN RATES TO CHICAGO.

TRUSTEES REGULATE POLITICS.

Jacksonian Club Places its Affairs in the Hands of a Board. The Jacksonian Club, of the Sixth Assembly District, held a special meeting at its club room, corner of Seventh street and Avenue C, last night, and adopted an amendment to the constitution of the club, by which it was provided that a board of trustees consisting of seven members shall be appointed forthwith and hold office for a term of six months, and shall regulate for the club all matters political.

BIG FIRE AT MILFORD CENTRE, O.

Still Raging After \$100,000 Damage Had Been Done. CLEVELAND, Aug. 11.—A big fire is raging at Milford Centre, O., this morning, and the fire is still burning brightly. A number of business houses and dwelling houses have been consumed.

Fires in Other Places.

The country north of Cartwright, Wis., is reported to be on fire. Summer resorts belonging to shipping people, bordering on the lake are in danger. Owners have sent men to fight the flames, and farmers are working hard to save their property. Cartwright citizens are preparing to fight the fire. Manitowish, Wis., was nearly wiped out by forest fires yesterday. Several buildings, together with \$200,000 of lumber, were burned. Loss, \$200,000. The locks block on St. Clair street, Toledo, O., was gutted by the last night, entailing a loss of \$60,000. Forest fires have done great damage near Stevens Point, Wis., especially to hay and growing crops. Farmers have lost most of their products, and several families have been obliged to flee from home for safety. The Terra House Car and Manufacturing Company's plant at Terra House, Ind., was partially destroyed by the yesterday. Loss, \$15,000; covered by insurance. Fire yesterday in Milwaukee destroyed the G. J. Peck salt Dock, a portion of the Northwestern Sleigh Company's building, the care of the Chicago Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad and the location of the Lumberman's Planing Mill.
