

ANTI-SNAPPERS OUT.

Bill Men Will Get Half of Their Seats in the Convention.

The Machine Likely to Make Raines Chairman.

Little Doubt in Saratoga of Maynard's Nomination.

SARATOGA, N. Y., Oct. 4.—The Democratic State Convention will be no brass band affair, but the machine is quietly in operation at the Adelphi, where the headquarters of the State Committee are being set up.

Charles DeForest, of the State Committee, has prepared a list of the delegates. It shows that contested and uncontested, the Anti-Snappers will claim between eighty and ninety seats in the Convention.

Everything is in readiness for the meeting of the convention at noon tomorrow. The Convention hall is one of the prettiest places of its kind. It is not a big, bare hall, with bare wooden walls in the country, but was built for a convention hall, with proper arrangements for ventilation, light and heat.

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MRS. FITZGERALD RESTS WELL.

Visited in Jail This Morning by Her Husband.

Her Victim's Funeral Will Take Place To-Morrow.

John J. Fitzgerald, husband of the woman who shot and killed Mrs. Charles Pearsall at 315 East Eighty-sixth street Monday afternoon, called on his wife in jail this morning. He found her resting easily.

Ever since the tragedy, which was caused by Mrs. Fitzgerald's jealousy of her husband's alleged attentions to Mrs. Pearsall, he has manifested affection for his wife. Beyond denying yesterday that there were any grounds for her suspicions, he has said nothing about the affair.

Fitzgerald has desk-room in the office of Lawyer Hobbs, in the Stewart Building. He arrived there this morning shortly after 10 o'clock. He looked considerably careworn. When an "Evening World" reporter asked him if he had any statement to make he said:

No; I have nothing whatever to say.

Some attaches of the Fifth District Police Court, when his wife was arraigned yesterday, Fitzgerald said she was undoubtedly insane from jealousy. That, he indicated, would be the line of defense. Those who spoke to Mrs. Fitzgerald said there is little evidence of insanity, but that she is emotional and excitable.

Lawyer Hobbs knows little about Fitzgerald. He said this morning that Fitzgerald spends little time in the office. Hobbs also said that he did not know Mrs. Fitzgerald, and never saw Mrs. Pearsall.

The body of the murdered woman still lies at 315 East Eighty-sixth street. The funeral will take place to-morrow.

Pearsall says he did not go to the Police Court yesterday morning when his wife's slayer was arraigned. He was then busy with the Deputy Coroner, he says.

Regarding the story that his wife was found wearing jewelry, he says it is quite true, but all the jewelry she possessed was purchased with her own money. She never received presents from any one. What she did buy, he says, was bought on the installment plan. The entire lot of jewelry was valued at less than \$200.

She was a hard-working woman, fond of her own home, she intended to do the household work herself, but liked to look neat when out walking.

Coroner Schuitze, who has charge of the case, had not decided this morning what he would do with the woman. The examination in the Police Court takes place Saturday.

FRIENDLY WITH MRS. STANFORD. Collis P. Huntington Denies the Rumors of an Unpleasantness.

It was stated in despatches from San Francisco, published to-day, that because some of her property was held by Mrs. Stanford, the latter had been named in the will of her husband, Mr. Stanford.

It was said that the property consists of holdings in the Southern Pacific Railway, of which Collis P. Huntington is President. Since the relations between Mrs. Stanford and Mr. Huntington were not as friendly as they were thought a great legal contest might arise.

Huntington said this morning, in reference to this report: "Mrs. Stanford has no interest in the Southern Pacific Railway, and I have no interest in the property of Mrs. Stanford. I can see how this can delay the completion of the inventory of the estate. I would have no trouble in ascertaining either the nature or value of any property in the company, as is alleged."

"There is no misunderstanding between Mrs. Stanford and myself. On the contrary, the most friendly relations exist, as did also between the late Mr. Stanford and myself. I am a large shareholder in the Pacific Improvement Company."

ELIVEN FAMILIES HOMELESS. Big Tenement House Fire at Yonkers This Morning.

YONKERS, N. Y., Oct. 4.—The large eight-story tenement-house at 129 Hawthorne avenue, this city, owned by Thomas Pratt, was completely gutted by fire at about 2:30 o'clock this morning. Eleven families, including that of the owner, occupied the house. Nothing worth speaking of was saved, the majority being taken over in driving carts from the burning building in their night clothes.

The loss on the building is estimated at \$30,000, and on the contents at \$10,000. The loss on the building is partly covered by insurance, but the furniture of the tenants was insured for a little over \$10,000.

A BLAZE IN PITTSBURG. Two Big Establishments in Flames This Morning.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 4.—A. G. Pratt & Co.'s sporting goods store and Wainwright Brothers' brush and paint manufacturing plant, corner Wood and Fifth avenues, are burning.

Fires in Other Places. Fire at North Ocean, N. Y., this morning destroyed a store of business plates and private dishes, carrying a loss of about \$40,000. Insurance \$25,000.

Another store was burned last night near Memphis, Tenn., over incandescent lamps, about \$10,000.

NO FATAL HAZING. Story of a Princeton Freshman's Death Discredited.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 4.—The Faculty and students of Princeton College were much surprised to see it stated in the newspapers this morning that a freshman had died during a hazing of some kind at Princeton. The story was that there had been a fatal hazing. It was declared to be without foundation.

Battered with Brass Knuckles. Patrick Guilfoyle, a laborer, was in a horribly battered state when taken to Bellevue Hospital this morning. His injuries, which were chiefly about the face, were inflicted with brass knuckles by an unknown cabman. The latter had been driving a hack to a restaurant on Sixth avenue, near 110th street, Guilfoyle interfered in the fight, and was also assaulted by the cabman. The wounded man is forty-seven years old, and resides on Sixth avenue, near Fifty-fourth street. He may die.

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
