The slate published last evening included Ashbel P. Fitch for Comptroller, J. H. V. Arnold for Surrogate, Miles Beach for Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, Lewis J. Conlon and James M. Fitzsimons for Judges of the City Court, and Charles M. Clancy for Sheriff.

Col. Fellows was not even dreamed of by the shrewdest guessers. His nomination, however, sheds a light on Tammany politics and the position that governs, to some extent, the nominations in Tammany Hall.

Col. Fellows is not a man of the type that would attract a ticket that will gain the full support of Tammany voters. Every man on the list is an organization man, and the list is a list of all orders from Fourteenth street; who will devote all his energies and his office to the interests of the organization first, last and all the time. And that is the best recommendation for a candidate among Tammany voters.

Tammany for Tammany men only, in this campaign cry suggested for this ticket. Furthermore, by placing Congressman Fitch in the City Court district, the vacancies are made for two men that it is policy to take care of.
