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




























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CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—At 9 o'clock probably 5,000 people were still awaiting admission at the eastern portion of the City Hall, where Mayor Harrison's body lay in state. The funeral arrangements, however, necessitated the doors being closed.

Preparations for the removal of the body were then commenced. The casket was lifted from the bier and the lid was removed. On top was placed the Maltese cross of the association "Father" and the pillow of illies with the name of "Papa," which were the tributes of the daughters and sons of the murdered man.

In the mean time the various societies and organizations whose representation in the parade had been accepted, were forming on the lake front and the streets adjacent thereto. At 2:30 o'clock the doors of the building were again opened, and with heads uncovered and reverently bowed the guard of honor passed down the steps.

Behind them, borne by eight sturdy members of the Police and Fire Departments, came the casket. The heads of thousands of spectators were bared as the casket was borne down the sidewalk and placed upon the funeral car.

A signal by Marshal Marshall J. Doyle, and the head of the procession moved. A platoon of police led the way; then came the Fire Department, the Fifteenth Infantry of the United States troops, commanded respectively by Col. Croft and Lieut. Col. Green.

Next in line were the regulars, Brig-Gen. H. A. Wheeler, of the First Brigade of the Illinois National Guard, with his staff; the National Guard, the First Artillery; the First and Second Regiments, of the National Guard, and the Royal Scots, headed by the officers of the Royal Scots.

In this division of the parade alone there were nearly five thousand uniformed men. The next division was that of the Department of Police, a band of brass instruments preceded Chief Brennan and his inspectors and every precinct in the city was represented by as many men as could be spared from duty.

The Fire Department division, commanded by Marshal Healey, consisted of a delegation of light fire-fighters from each of the thirteen battalions. Like the police, they were in full uniform, and wore memorial buttons.

Next in line, mounted on their richly caparisoned horses, were the Chicago Hussars, under command of Capt. Brand.

These acted as escort to the carriages occupied by the honorary pall-bearers, who were as follows: T. W. Palmer, ex-Gov. Oglesby, F. H. Winston, Adolf Kraus, ex-Minister from Germany, W. B. Burne, H. N. Higginbotham, Ferd. W. Peck, C. Fitzsimmons, C. K. G. Billings, ex-Minister from France, J. A. P. Miles, Lyman Trumbull, H. J. Jones, P. A. Armour, ex-Mayor Medill, R. A. Waller, ex-Mayor.

There was a slight break in the procession at this point. When came the funeral car, drawn by four horses, and on either side, with slow and stately step, marched the active pall-bearers, representing the Police and Fire Departments.

So far the line had been official; now it became the turn of the people. In the detachment after detachment, for over an hour, marched the members of the various organizations, Republican and labor organizations, representatives of the French-Canadian, Scandinavian, Italian and British societies.
