

TWICE CARRIED OUT.

Mrs. Haas, an Invalid, Saved from Two Fires.

Both Broke Out Within an Hour of Each Other.

Firemen Have Plenty of Work on Avenue B.

The lower part of Avenue B gave the firemen a lot of work early this morning. Three fires broke out in rapid succession, two of them being in the same house, a five-story tenement, 28 Avenue B.

Shortly after 2 A. M. a signal was sent in from the box at Avenue B and Third street. The firemen found flames shooting out of the basement of 28 Avenue B, occupied by John Berner at the same time were rushing about panic-stricken.

The wife of the housekeeper of the tenement, Henry Haas, is an invalid, who has been in her bed for days. The family live on the third floor. When Haas awoke he found his rooms full of smoke.

Catching up a blanket, he threw it about his wife, and through the smoke staggered with his burden downstairs to the street, where kind friends took the invalid to their apartments.

JUPITER'S FIFTH MOON.

Astronomers Will Eagerly Watch for It This Evening.

Astronomical cranks for some time past have been more than usually interested in the movements of the big planet Jupiter. The reason is that he has been approaching opposition, which is the point in his orbit reached when the planet is nearest the earth and directly opposite the sun.

In other words, the relative positions of the earth and Jupiter are such that an imaginary straight line drawn from the sun through the earth and extended outward to the orbit of Jupiter would find the great planet somewhere in that neighborhood in its path around the sun.

This combination of circumstances, which is always the most favorable for observing and studying the superior planet, occurs today in the case of Jupiter, and if it is clear to-night the big telescopes all over the Western hemisphere will be pointed up at the bright star, which at midnight will be almost directly in the zenith.

Among the most interesting things about Jupiter are his moons. Until about a year ago it was supposed that he had only four satellites, but a year ago a fifth was discovered by the astronomers at Lick Observatory, California.

This fifth moon, which is in opposition, and the return to this position will be pointed up at the bright star, which at midnight will be almost directly in the zenith.
