

ANARCHISTS RAIDED.

Headquarters of Spanish "Reds" Found in Barcelona.

Arrests in Paris—Threats of Dynamite Outrages in France.

Evidence that the Rescue of Pallas Was to Have Been Attempted.

(By Associated Press.)

BARCELONA, Nov. 22.—Another sensation has been caused here by the discovery of a nest of Anarchists at 29 Ronda San Pablo, this city.

It now appears that this has been the place where the chief Anarchist Club of Spain met, and from whence its chiefs directed the policy of the many other Anarchist clubs in the kingdom.

The police arrested Miguel Nacher, President of the Spanish Anarchists, and two women, who are said to have acted for the Anarchists in conveying messages to and from points outside the city.

The police also obtained possession of a large quantity of materials and chemicals used in the manufacture of dynamite bombs, as well as a quantity of loaded and unloaded bombs, a large number of pistols and a mass of Anarchist literature.

Documents were seized which, it is believed, will enable the police to cause many other Anarchist branches in Spain, France and Italy, and in other foreign countries, to be raided.

During the day, owing to information obtained at the Ronda San Pablo headquarters, the police also raided the house of the wife of an Anarchist known as Pablo Bernat, situated in the vicinity of the Castle of Mont Juich, in front of which fortification Pallas, the Anarchist, was recently shot to death for his attempt to kill Gen. Martinez Campos.

The documents discovered in the house show that for some days previous to Pallas's execution, a number of Anarchists, supplied with bombs, were housed in the residence of Bernat, evidently intending to use the bombs among the troops, hoping to cause a terrible panic, during which Pallas was to have been assisted to escape.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—The police of St. Etienne have raided a number of haunts where French and foreign Anarchists were supposed to be in hiding, and have seized an Anarchist manifesto, which is said to have been distributed in many parts of France, and may have been mailed to foreign countries, defending the dynamite outrages at Barcelona and at Marseilles.

It also predicts that other and similar outrages would soon be perpetrated in France. Several arrests have been made.

Bait Against "Squire" Abingdon's Estate for \$75,000.

"Squire" Abingdon Baird for \$75,000, being the balance unpaid of a consideration of \$125,000, which, it is alleged, Baird promised to pay the plaintiff for quickly recovering bank notes to the amount of \$25,000, said to have been stolen from Baird by a woman.

PROPOSED AFRICAN RAILWAY.

United States and England May Protest Against It.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A Lisbon despatch to The Times says that to reduce the value of the Delagoa Bay Railroad in the eyes of the arbitrators it is proposed to build a railway from the mouth of the Limpopo River parallel with the Delagoa Bay Railway and at a distance of one hundred kilometers from it towards the River Sabi, from which it will run in a southerly direction along the Transvaal frontier to Komati Poort.

Should the project be put into execution and infringe the former concessions, it is said that the United States and the English governments have resolved to protest.

Great Loss of Life Along the French Coast.

MORE FLOODS IN JAPAN.

Hundreds of Lives Lost—Chinese Pirates Active.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 22.—The steamer Empress of China, from Yokohama, brings news that floods have devastated the harbor of Nagasaki and have done considerable damage as far as Yokohama and Tokio.

In Okayama Prefecture, 167 lives were lost and 2,000 houses destroyed. In Yamaguchi Prefecture 300 fishermen were drowned.

The Chinese pirates are very active. During the last month they seized eleven junks. The authorities are powerless against them.

May Have to Amputate Gen. Gourko's Foot.

WON'T BOUNCE MR. THURSTON

Administration Not to Consider His Reply to Blount Official.

License to the Hawaiian Minister on Grounds of "Fair Play."

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Minister Thurston, of Hawaii, is not likely to receive his passports, although it was said at the State Department this morning that there was abundant ground for such action.

Were it in any other country or in this country under any other circumstances, his passports would be issued immediately.

It is claimed that his published letter referring to the Blount report is a breach of diplomacy and amply sufficient to warrant this Government in immediately severing all relations with the Hawaiian Minister.

Such action would be taken but for the reason that the American people might not think it was fair play. The right of any man to talk and give his side of a controversy is always conceded, and to force Mr. Thurston to leave this country, would be considered by some people a disposition not to allow the other side a hearing.

The Department chooses to consider the published extracts of the Blount report, and is simply a direct personal denial of the testimony that the United States marines were dependent upon the success of the Hawaiian revolution.

Mr. Thurston criticizes Mr. Blount's method of inquiry as one-sided, and refers to himself as one deeply interested party on the side of the Provisional Government, who was not asked for information.

CLERK HAD NO LICENSE.

He Put Up a Prescription and Drug-gist O'Connor Was Arrested.

John O'Connor, manager of a drug-store at 581 Ninth avenue, was held in \$200 bail for trial in Jefferson Market Court this morning on a charge of permitting an unlicensed clerk to compound prescriptions.

The complainant was Dr. Ernest J. Lederle, of the Board of Health staff. Dr. Lederle alleges that Nov. 4 he called at the store for the absence of Manager O'Connor, to have a prescription filled, and that the clerk, who is not a licensed pharmacist, took the prescription and filled it.

Mr. O'Connor denies that he had authorized the clerk to put up prescriptions.

Runaway Girls Returned.

ANNIE WALDEN'S CASE.

Gov. Flower Asks Mr. Nicoll to Make an Investigation.

District-Attorney Nicoll this morning received a telegram from Gov. Flower asking that an immediate investigation be made and an official report sent to him in the case of Annie Walden, who is serving a life sentence in State prison for the murder of her husband.

Rev. Stradford Hamilton, who has charge of the charity organizations on Blackwell's Island, has been making a strong effort to have the woman's sentence shortened or an absolute pardon granted.

At the time of her conviction, April 25, 1892, Annie was twenty-three years old. She was found guilty of murder in the second degree before Judge Ingraham, in the Court of Oyer and Terminer.

In October, 1891, she had a quarrel with her husband, Jimmy Walden, a son of Peter Walden, the well-known turfman, in front of the Metropolitan Opera-House, during which she shot and killed him. It was said that she was jealous of him.

Annie has been in the hospital ward of the prison almost constantly since the beginning of her sentence.

ROETH WAS DRUNK, NOT INSANE.

Deimonico's Crank Will Be Tried for Malicious Mischief.

Warden James W. Ledwith, of Jefferson Market Prison, officially notified Justice Hogan in Jefferson Market Police Court this morning that George Roeth, the alleged crank, who created a panic in Deimonico's Broadway restaurant a few nights ago by firing bullets through the windows and into the walls and ceiling, was not insane, and that he would be returned to the custody of the Court to-day.

Roeth was examined as to his sanity by Drs. Field and Douglas, and found to be merely suffering from delirium tremens.

He will be arraigned either this afternoon or to-morrow morning to answer a charge of malicious mischief.

WANTS WASHINGTON'S BOUNTY.

Lawyer Levy Visited by an Elderly Female Crank.

Lawyer Abraham Levy, of the Pulitzer Building, received a visit from an elderly woman this morning who had a mild form of insanity. She described herself as Mary Ann Powers, of 21 Vineyard avenue, Yonkers.

She was ushered into Mr. Levy's private office, and at his request submitted to him the cases she wished him to handle for her.

"I want the bounty money left by Gen. George Washington, and desire you to begin action at once for it. Then also bring suit for the money which was collected all over the world for my son Thomas when he was down with yellow fever."

"I am related to Queen Elizabeth," she continued, "and my grandmother is a near relative to the Queen of England. All the money that was collected for my son was used to erect the Statue of Liberty, and I want you to bring suit against the statue for the recovery of that money."

"There is a conspiracy afoot to get rid of me, Cruger of men come into my room at night, use vile language to me and speak of killing me. I am afraid. When I am in the kitchen reading they sprinkle chloroform over the newspaper and spread it over the floor until I succumb to its effect."

"When they put electricity into my palms and pain, and whenever I touch them I receive a severe shock. This is all being done at the instance of Father Xavier, who pays these men to injure me."

Mr. Levy advised her to go home and remain there. This remark seemed to hurt Mrs. Powers's feelings, and as she arose to go she said: "I will write to the Queen's children and state my case to them."

Republican Investigating Committee Begins Work To-Morrow.
