WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The President's message, transmitted to Congress to-day, after a brief introductory paragraph, proceeds as follows:

FOREIGN RELATIONS. While our foreign relations have not at all times during the past year been entirely free from perplexity, no embarrassing situation remains that will not yield to the spirit of fairness and love of justice, which, joined with consistent firmness, characterize a truly American foreign policy.

BRAZILIAN TROUBLES. The outbreak of domestic hostilities in the Republic of Brazil found the United States desirous to watch the interests of our citizens in that country, with which we carry on important commerce.

CHILIAN CONVENTION. The Convention for the settlement and adjustment of the demands of the two countries on each other, which was entered into by the organization of the Claims Commission provided for by the Convention of 1881, is now in the hands of the third member of the Commission, the Hon. Charles D. Walcott, who is in the city of Santiago, Chile, and is endeavoring to bring about a settlement of the claims of the United States and of Chile.

ANTI-CHINESE LEGISLATION. The legislation of last year, known as the Geary law, requiring the registration of all Chinese laborers entitled to residence in the United States, and the deportation of all not so registered, has been the subject of much opposition from Chinese in this country, and in the United States.
