EXTRA. 2 O'CLOCK. CROKER'S NEW PLAN.

Is It to Pacify the Business Men of This City? Doubling of District Leaders a Surprise to Politicians. More Trouble Expected from Ex-Senator Plunkitt.

Tammany men would not talk this morning about Richard Croker's latest scheme to increase the Executive Committee or number of district leaders of Tammany Hall from thirty to sixty.

The order from the chief was a stunning surprise to the district leaders. They can't understand what it means. Croker's order is that the thirty leaders must be business men.

As the leaders were not consulted they had no chance to make selections of candidates. Possibly Mr. Croker intends to relieve them of all embarrassment in the matter and select their candidates himself.

It is believed that the new order is an expedient to cover cases similar to that of the late Mayor. Under the plan, Croker will have a complete list of names to choose from.

But for a Detective Cook Cuno Would Have Been Laid Out. James Cuno, a cook, living at 304 Columbus avenue, was complainant in Jefferson Market Court to-day against Henry Williams, alias Charles Williams, of 12 West Twenty-sixth street, whose picture is No. 26 in the Rogues' Gallery, and William Walsh, of 14 West Houston street, whom he accused of trying to rob him last night.

SENT FOR POLICE CAPTAINS. Haughey and Cortright Summoned to See Byrnes. The Superintendent is Reticent About Yesterday's Meeting.

Several politicians called at Police Headquarters this morning and lingered about the corridors discussing the various moves of the Commissioner's chess board. Excise Commissioner Murphy was an early arrival. He went to Supt. Byrnes's office and remained in consultation with him for about fifteen minutes.

In the Superintendent's office there was considerable bustle. A message was sent to the Twenty-second Precinct ordering Capt. Haughey to report to Headquarters forthwith. A similar command went to the Eleventh Precinct, Capt. Devery's late command, but word was returned that Capt. Cortright was out on patrol.

It is thought that the Superintendent wants to interview Capt. Cortright relative to an arrest made Monday in the charge of being derelict in duty. Elbridge, of 159 Allen street, the victim, alleges that she is a respectable woman, and not a keeper of a disorderly house, as charged.

Several weeks ago Dr. De Waltorf ordered a suit of clothes from the woman's husband, Bernard Deitcher, who does a tailoring business at the above address. When the clothes were delivered it was found that they didn't fit, and the doctor sent them back to be altered.

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BOYNTON VOWING VENGEANCE. Given His Liberty Yesterday and Now Wants Damages.

Dr. G. B. Boynton, who is credited with a scheme to blow up one of Admiral Michol's warships at Rio and who was arrested in the harbor of the latter place on Sept. 26 and put on board the United States cruiser Detroit, was around this morning, breathing vengeance against the United States Government.

At the Navy-Yard this morning it was said that Boynton had been confined only a short time, and that he had been ordered to parole him were received from Secretary Herbert. He still wore the clothing he was wearing when arrested in the tropical climate of Brazil, and turning up his coat collar, he walked out of the Navy-Yard gate, declaring that he didn't know where he would remain all night.

Among naval officers it is thought that Secretary Herbert concluded Boynton would be a white elephant on the Government's hands. Even if it could be proven that he was planning to blow up Aquilaban, those who have studied the question are unable to determine what greater offense there is in that than in enlisting on the Nietheroy and other ships of the Navy, and the same end Boynton hoped to accomplish with dynamite.

ANDREWS, JUDGMENT DEBTOR. Street-Cleaning Commissioner in Supplementary Proceedings. He Owes Charles A. Seymour \$1,639.28 for Rent.

Street-Cleaning Commissioner William S. Andrews appeared before Judge Bischoff, in the Court of Common Pleas, this morning, as a judgment debtor in supplementary proceedings on a judgment for \$1,639.28 for rent, recovered on June 22, 1911, by Charles A. Seymour. The Commissioner requested an adjournment for ten days, on the ground that he had matters to attend to before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and, therefore, could not spare the time to answer questions.

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DYNAMITE INJURES TWO MEN. A Cartridge Concealed in Rubbish Accidentally Explodes. The Victims Taken to Fordham Hospital Badly Wounded.

Two men were seriously if not fatally injured this morning by the explosion of a dynamite cartridge on a dirt spout on the Harlem Ship Canal at Spuyten Duyvil. The men are John Roardan, twenty-three years old, of Two Hundred and Twentieth street and Kingsbridge Road, and Richard Sinnott, twenty years old, of Albany avenue and Kingsbridge Road.
