MRS. CHARLES SECURES BAIL.

"Recherche Hotel" Keeper's Examination To-Morrow.

Capt. Schmittberger's Other Prisoners Will Appear Monday.

Mrs. Emma Charles, ex-proprietress of the notorious "House of All Nations," at 110 West Thirty-third street, but now the hostess of the "Recherche" Hotel, 117 to 123 West Thirty-second street, was held in \$500 bonds to-day, in Jefferson Market Court, for examination to-morrow on a charge of keeping a disorderly house.

Mrs. Charles, or Anna R. Clark, which is her real name, was very indignant in court to-day, because of her arrest. She has for many years enjoyed a "pull" of such magnitude that it has been a safeguard against her arrest.

Capt. Schmittberger, of the West Thirtieth street station, however, broke through all traditions last night, and ordered Detective Jeroloman and Waters to raid the "Recherche," and take Mrs. Charles and her head-waiter, Allen Gar, to the station-house.

The arrests were made on evidence obtained by Jeroloman and Waters, who have been playing the "dress suit game" for some nights past. Jeroloman got the evidence upon which the warrant for keeping a disorderly house was issued, and on Waters's affidavit an additional charge of breach of the Excise law was made.

Detective Jeroloman claims to have gone to the "Recherche" on the night of Dec. 13, and to have registered as "H. J. Johnson and wife, Flushing, L. I."

He declares that he was assigned a room.

In court this morning Mrs. Charles admitted to bail and her examination set down for to-morrow. This was agreed to, and Mr. Moss produced a Philadelphia-looking man, who said he was Ernest Crawford, a mechanical engineer, of 220 West Twenty-eighth street, an bondsman.

Mr. Crawford went on both Mrs. Charles's and Walter Gar's bond for a total of \$500.

After the proceedings Mrs. Charles was asked whether she thought Dr. Parkhurst had anything to do with her arrest. She replied:

"That is what I came here this morning to find out. I haven't wanted to know that shouldn't have come."

The case of Thomas W. Moffatt, proprietor of Moffatt's Restaurant, at 441 Sixth avenue, which was also raided by Capt. Schmittberger last night, was disposed of for the present by Justice McMahon holding Harry Adams and his two bartenders, Harry Raines and Benjamin F. Butler, under bonds for their appearance Jan. 15.

Albert J. Adams went on Moffatt's bond for \$500, and on those of Raines and Butler for \$100 each.

Was Thelma a Bowery Lodger?

The name of Ludwig Thelma, who walked into Chambers Street Hospital yesterday, suffering from small-pox, and who gave his address as 12 Bowery, could not be found on the register of the hospital, but was found at the Bowery. It was stated by an officer of the Board of Health, but soon being that no such person had been there, the lodging-house was not furnished. Thelma had been removed to North Brother Island.
