THE POLLARD SUIT. Reading of Depositions Resumed at This Morning's Session. Sister Augustine Disputes the "Louise Wilson" Story. She, Like Sister Agnes, Failed to Recognize the Plaintiff.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The reading of depositions was taken up again this morning, when the court met, in the Pollard case, to the regret of many spectators who had assembled with the expectation that Representative Breckinridge would tell his story. Madeline Pollard was seated beside her lawyer, Judge Wilson, talking to him with a smile playing across her face, and once she talked and glanced over her shoulder at the white-haired defendant. Before Attorney Stoll had proceeded far with his elocutionary efforts Miss Pollard and her companion rose and glided from the room, interrupting for a moment the reading.

FISHING SCHOONER SUNK. Stove a Hole in Her Side by Striking a Dock. STAPLETON, S. I., March 22.—The fishing schooner J. S. Becker, of Greenpoint, while passing down the bay this afternoon at 1 o'clock, fouled the long dock at this place. A hole was stove in the fishing schooner amidships on the starboard side. The schooner filled rapidly and soon sank.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Many of the Senators did not know until they read the Associated Press dispatch this morning that a new treaty had been negotiated and would soon be reported from the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations.

DENVER CITIZENS AROUSED. They Decide to Checkmate Waid with a Committee of Safety. DENVER, Col., March 22.—In consequence of the reports that large bodies of men are coming to aid the Governor in securing Mullins and Barnes in the Fire and Police Boards, if the Supreme Court does not answer his inquiry as to who are the lawful members, prominent citizens met last night and completed the organization of a Committee of Safety.

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EXTRA. READY TO HANG TWO. Prendergast and Another Condemned to Die To-Morrow. Last Effort Being Made to Save Mayor Harrison's Assassin. Judge Baker Consents to Hear a Trial as to His Sanity.

CHICAGO, March 22.—The Federal Judges to-day denied their aid to Prendergast. An exception to the decision of the court was taken by the defendant's attorneys, whereby they reserve the right to take an appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

JUDGE BAKER CONSENTS TO HEAR A TRIAL AS TO HIS SANITY. The decision of the United States Circuit Court was read by Judge Jenkins, represented the opinion of Judges Woods, Seaman and Bunn, as well. Judge Baker did not participate in the decision, as he was not present when the arguments were made by Attorney Gregory last night.

PRENDERGAST AND ANOTHER CONDEMNED TO DIE TO-MORROW. The attorneys next decided to raise the question of Prendergast's sanity, under a specific statute of the State, and Attorney S. R. Gregory proceeded immediately to make a last effort to at least postpone the execution until the mental condition of the condemned man could be passed upon by a jury of his peers.

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
