NOT ONE GOOD CLUE.

Detectives All at Sea in the Susie Martin Case.

Figuring Now that a Breweryman Was Concerned in It.

Burial of the Mutilated Corpse in Culinary.

If the mutilated trunk of the child found in the cellar of 617 West Thirty- ninth street is not that of eleven-year- old Susie Martin, as is believed by Dr. O'Hare, many others, at all events it was buried this forenoon in Calvary Cemetery under the name of Susie adri- nium. The corpse was taken from the Morgue at 9:30 o'clock this morning, and was followed by a single coach contain- ing the parents of the girl and two friends.

Central Office Detectives Dowling and Rogers were stationed on the northeast corner of Thirty-ninth street and Tenth avenue this morning. This is directly opposite Stevenson's brewery. The de- tectives seem to think they can get some clue regarding the murder from the brewery. The rear windows of the brewery look directly out upon the yard, from which an entrance to the cellar is reached.

Detectives Valley, Armstrong and Evanhoe were busy at the various dumps in and about the neighborhood. None of them, however, had anything of value to offer in the way of brushing up the mystery. When interrogated they could only reply: "We haven't found anything yet."

Attention is now being directed toward the sewers in the neighborhood. This is for the purpose of discovering the missing head, arms and legs of the butchered child.

One detective argued that if this crime was the work of a Chinaman, he would have made a complete job of it. It would not have been a matter of in- terruption and would have disposed of the trunk in a different manner.

On the other hand, any employee of a brewery or slaughter-house were to be at all unlikely by the approach of other divorces. Magee's own statement, made to Detective Webb, promises to solve to a certain extent the three-and-a-half years' acquaintance between him and the dead girl.

CURRENTS NOT NAMED

Commander Heyerman Pleads a Want of Definite Specifications.

Indication that Technicalities Will Be Taken Advantage Of.

Kearsarge Court-Martial Decides to Proceed on Charges as Read.

The first business of the court martial appointed to try Commander Oscar F.
