

MORE RIOTING IN SANTANDER.

Sight of a Funeral Procession Enrages the Populace.

Authorities Blamed for Dynamite Explosion in the Bay.

(By Associated Press.)

SANTANDER, March 23.—The authorities decided that the funeral of the victims should be held yesterday, and the bodies were hurriedly prepared for burial. Some of the victims were so horribly mangled that it was impossible to identify them.

Notwithstanding the presence of the military from the adjacent towns, the excited populace manifested an ugly disposition, and there was no relaxation of the measures taken to guard against an outbreak.

Large crowds gathered along the streets through which the bodies of the victims were conveyed on the way to the cemetery, and many and bitter were the threats made against the authorities for what the crowd declared was their criminal carelessness. It was evident that it would take but a spark to light into flame the repressed fury of the populace. The spark was furnished by the appearance of the hearse conveying the dead.

As though they acted upon some prearranged signal the crowd began to riot, and for a time it looked as though the city would be given over to mob violence. The authorities, however, were prepared for an outbreak, and soon a strong force of soldiers was at the scene. Orders were given to clear the streets, and the cavalry rode down on the howling, cursing and fighting mob. There was little resistance, the rioters fled almost to a man when they saw the gleaming sabres of the cavalrymen. Disturbances at other points along the route of the funeral cortege were quickly quelled, and the bodies were interred without further trouble.

No further attempt will be made to raise whatever may remain of the dynamite in the bulk of the Cabo Machich. The authorities believe that no dynamite remains in the steamer, but with a view to satisfying the public demand that no more lives be endangered, either in attempting to save dynamite or what remains of the steamer, it has been ordered that the bulk be destroyed by means of petards.

MORE NEWS OF ICEBERGS.

The Steamer Stuttgart Reports Passing a Big Floe.

More news of icebergs at sea was brought to port this morning by the steamer Stuttgart, which arrived at the bar from Bremen at 3.30. She carried five cabin and 162 steerage passengers for New York, and twelve cabin and 654 steerage passengers for Baltimore.

Her captain reported that on March 18, in latitude 42° 48', longitude 49° 48', the ship passed an iceberg 200 feet long and 50 feet high. The Apollo was not sighted on the voyage.

REGULAR LONDON FOG.

Gotham Had a Sample of the Genuine Thames Article.

At first it seemed to heap up the clouds banks more closely and make it darker and more oppressive than before. But this only lasted a few minutes, when the stiff breeze began to sweep the mist away.

SHERIFF AND MEN ACCUSED.

Said to Have Murdered a Man Near an Illinois Dam.

MURPHYSBOROUGH, Ill., March 23.—Thomas Green, a hunter, was an object last evening floating in the deep waters that are held back by the Goodman dam in Union County. It proved to be the body of Thomas Robertson, who has been missing since the evening of Feb. 28, and who was supposed to have been killed by a posse organized by the Sheriff of Union County to surprise and capture a party of conspirators who were known to intend cutting the dam that night.

Three men, suspected of having caused Robertson's death, are under arrest. The coroner's inquest is still in progress. Charles Whittier, accused many prominent men besides Sheriff Rich and his deputies. He swears that they left off almost his entire posse were drunk on the evening of the attempted cutting of the dam, and made no effort to capture Robertson, but fired on him with intent to kill.
