There will be another wrestling with the Blanket Bill at Albany this week. Now, to see upon how many new minds the fact has dawned that a blanket master is the only fit running mate for the blanket ballot at the polls.

Illegal dumping still goes on in New York Bay, and the finest natural harbor in the world is at the mercy of the men who break the law in this regard. It does seem as if Congress might spare a few moments from its quarterly and quorum-huntings to provide a remedy here.

New York preferred the Chamber of Commerce Rapid Transit bill as it was drawn. But better a little compromise than a defeat of the whole plan outlined and a relegation of everything to the hands of Tammany and Manhattan. A thing to be remembered is the promise, made as if by authority, that in appointing a commission under the proposed law, Flower will bear in mind the city's choice as evinced in the names given in the original bill.

A twelve-year-old boy at Ridgefield Park, N. J., who had a habit of pointing the gun around whenever he could get hold of it, has achieved the distinction of blowing off the top of a young woman's head with a charge of shot.

The utter hopelessness of a search for a penalty to adequately fit this heinous crime is enough to torture the brain and heart of the intelligent citizen. The thing is beyond the scope of any es-

ablished code. But, so far as the law can do in the case, it should go promptly, regardless of the years of the offender, which were certainly enough, as his actions after the tragedy proved, to give him a comprehending sense of how criminal was his carelessness.

WORSE THAN TREASON.

The Carnegie corporation is again before the public. Its last appearance was as the employer of armed Pinkerton guards, and it is now being charged with having sent out its fortified factory. It seems likely that it may now be compelled to hire shrewd and experienced lawyers to keep somebody out of jail.

It is alleged that the Carnegie corporation is not only in the line of the law, but is also alleged that by collusion insufficient projects were used in testing the plates.

If these allegations are true, there could only have been one object in the fraud, the robbery of the Government. Can any crime be conceived more heinous than the risking of the honor of the nation and the lives of its brave defenders for the sake of making a few extra dollars out of a Government contract?

"WHERE AM I AT?" New York's own Chamney M. Dewey has been telling the people of St. Louis of the folly of too early a start and too long a course in a Presidential race.

He says a candidate for that high office two or three years before the event comes off like the athlete who took a ten-mile run to make a high jump at the end of the ten miles failed to jump at all.

Perhaps this accounts for the magnate's assertion that the association of his own name with the Republican nomination for 1896 is only a joke. Probably it is only a joke because he loves to perpetrate after a good dinner.

At the Democratic nominee at the close of President Cleveland's term, Mr. Dewey said he did not think the Democrats need worry about any candidate.

The average Democrat, he said, is asking himself, "Am I a Cleveland Democrat, or a Hill Democrat, or a silver Democrat, or a hard-money Democrat, or a monometalist, or what in the devil am I?"

There is some truth in this. At the same time, is not the average Republican asking himself, "Am I a Platt Republican, or a Union League Republican, or a Harrison Republican, or a Blaine Republican, or a silver Republican, or a gold Republican, or an anti-corporation Republican, or what in the devil am I?"

It is about as much of a puzzle to a Republican as to a Democrat at this time to answer the question "Where am I at?"

REGULARS TO VOTE TO-NIGHT.
