EIGHT HELD FOR ROBBERY.

Thousands of Dollars Worth of Freeman's Property Stolen.

Thieves Used a Wagon to Remove His Feed and Harness.

Detectives Smith and Money, of the East One Hundred and Fourth station, arraigned in the Harlem Police Court this morning eight men, who are charged with robbing Henry F. Freeman, owner of a moving van and storage establishment, at 20 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, of oats, harness and blankets, to the amount of several thousand dollars.

Freeman's stables, from which the property was stolen, are at 25 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

The prisoners gave their names as Constantine Hecht, alias Dead-Eye-Dick, fifty years old, of 231 East One Hundred and Seventh street; Salvatore Misantoni, thirty-three years old, of 323 East One Hundred and Ninth street; Constantino Demitico, twenty-five years old, of 121 East One Hundred and Eleventh street; Mike O'Brien, twenty-one years old, of 20 East One Hundred and Eleventh street; Francisco Caponetti, twenty-seven years old, of 42 East One Hundred and Thirteenth street; all Italians, and Charles Heffer, fifteen years old, of 115 East One Hundred and Twelfth street; George Hefferman, twenty years old, of One Hundred and Twenty-third street and Third avenue, and William Krambach, seventeen years old, of One Hundred and Twelfth street and First avenue.

During the greater part of the winter and spring Freeman has been missing quantities of oats, hay, feed and harness. The missing property was valued at \$2,000. He was surprised when Detectives Smith and Money arrested Hecht, and found sixty-five bags of oats in the latter's cellar. The bags had Freeman's initials and numbers on them. Freeman did not think the gang had carried off so large a quantity.

After making an inventory he found that he had been robbed of several thousand dollars' worth of feed, hay, oats, and harness. He had given to the police a list of the property, and Hecht had a horse and wagon, which he had in getting off the oats and other property.

Justice Weide held each of the men in \$1,000 bail for examination. Charles Heffer, who is not yet sixteen years old, was turned over to the Gerry Society.

BURGLARS IN A CHURCH.

Two Men Had the Pastor's Overcoat and Cane.

John Lynch, twenty-one years old, of 311 Houston street, and Charles Hadley, twenty-five, no home, were held for trial in the Jefferson Market Police Court today on a charge of burglary.

George Schweitzer, a watchman, at the Academy Church, 115 West 115th street, saw a crowd in front of a window at the side of the church yesterday afternoon. He discovered that the men were standing there to hide their faces from the watchman. He called the police, and they entered the church and arrested the two men who had stolen a \$15 overcoat and a gold-headed cane belonging to the pastor, Rev. Dr. J. S. Stone.

Schweitzer captured the two men who had entered the church, but the ten or twelve confederates got away.

HELD AND ROBBED.

Mason Has Actor Ward and a Friend Arrested on the Charge.

An actor named Robert Ward, forty years old, of 30 East Third street, and James B. Mullen, thirty-five years old, of 13 Stanton street, were held in the Essex Market Police Court today.

Henry Mason, who lives at 11 Bowery, said that while in a room at 13 Stanton street the two men held at his hands while a woman went through his pockets and stole \$2.

Mason shouted for the police, and the two men were arrested. The woman charged her escape. The men deny the charge.

PRETTY CASHIER A THIEF.

Unites Devoe Systematically Robs Truesdell, Spreter & Co.

Believed to Have Taken \$1,500 Since October.

Unites Devoe, twenty years old, of 24 West Eighty-fourth street, was held for trial at Jefferson Market Police Court today charged with stealing systematically from Truesdell, Spreter & Co., dry-goods dealers, at 27 Eighth avenue.

She was a cashier in the store. She had been in charge of the cashier's department on Saturday since last October, and, according to her own admissions, has been stealing all that time.

She accomplished this by adding the cash checks incorrectly and deducting money to make the matter square.

She was charged specifically with the larceny of \$2 on Saturday night. She confessed to W. J. Underwood, attorney for the firm, that she had taken the money. She also sent home and obtained \$2, which she had given to her mother to keep, any turned that over to Mr. Underhill.

George L. Devoe, of the firm, appeared as complainant at court today. He said he believed she had taken \$1,500 in all. He was at a loss to understand how she had used such an amount of money, as she had no lover and had given no signs of extravagant living.

The girl's mother, a kindly-faced German woman, asked before Justice Meahan this morning. She had had no idea that her daughter was dishonest until she was arrested.

The girl is a decidedly pretty beauty. She was held in \$1,000 bail.

MURDERER MILLER HELD.

Will Await the Grand Jury's Action, Without Bail.

Charles Miller of 221 East Thirteenth street, the self-confessed murderer of Night Watchman August Loeffler, of Heide's candy factory at 181 Franklin street, early last Wednesday morning, was given an examination in the Tombs Police Court this morning.

Miller was held by Miller without bail for the Grand Jury.

Charles Miller, twenty-two years old, of 22 East Thirteenth street, was taken to the Presbyterian Hospital early this morning suffering from wounds on the hips, inflicted with a knife by his brother John. The latter was arrested and locked up in the East Sixty-ninth street station.

MURDER AT SCHOOL DEBATE.

Two Killed and Six Badly Hurt in the Fracas.

LIMA, O., April 23.—In a fight at a country school debate near Winchester, Nathan Mandeloff was stabbed in the back and injured so badly that he died in a few hours, and Ed Carroll's skull was crushed with a club. The fight started among some of the smaller children and before it was terminated everybody in the house was mixed up in it. Eva Kratzer, the teacher, armed herself with a stick of wood and dealt Henry Steinman a blow over the head.

Six persons were so badly hurt that they had to be taken home, and the teacher's desk had the effect of rearing many of the wounded ones.
