A Colonel Dismissed and a Company of Fifty Men Disbanded.

NEOLA, Ia., April 23.—Kelly's Industrial Army awoke to-day to find itself in a state of mutiny.

The general proposed to the occasion, and before the march had begun, the company had been stripped of its rank and a company of fifty dismissed from the service.

As soon as the bugle sounded a commotion was called. The officers declared unanimously against Baker and he was promptly expelled, much to the satisfaction of the men.
