LABOR LEADERS DEFIANT.

Think Gov. Pattison's Proclamation Exceeds His Authority. PITTSBURGH, May 31.—Concerning Gov. Pattison's proclamation calling on good citizens in the coke region to refrain from aiding and abetting riotous demonstrations, President John Cairns, of the Pittsburgh district United Mine-Workers, said last night:

"I do not believe the Governor has any right to order men to disperse when they are peacefully assembled upon their own property, or when they march unarmed and no violent intent upon the public highway is shown. Such a proclamation is a contempt of the law, and I think for the Government to attempt to enforce it is a violation of its duty. I shall probably so advise the Governor."

Organizer John Nugent was more vehement, and indicated that he thought it would be necessary to exceed his functions, and I shall probably so advise the Governor. "If I have any voice in the matter I will not be paid to the proclamation."

CHAMPAGNE HER WEAKNESS.

Wardwell's Experience with Mrs. Coddington-Fellows. Says He Frequently Saw Her Under the Influence of Liquor.

The Commissioners and Sheriff's jury appointed to inquire as to the advisability of the commitment of Mrs. Alma Louise Coddington-Fellows, of 44 East Sixty-sixth street, resumed their inquiry this morning in Part II. of the Supreme Court.

The action is brought by relatives of Clifford Coddington, deceased, the former husband of Mrs. Coddington-Fellows, alleging that she is an inebriate. Mrs. Coddington-Fellows denies the charge that she drinks to excess, and says that her late husband's relatives kidnapped two of her children. One of them, Gladys, three years old, has since been returned to her mother.

Mrs. Coddington-Fellows was not in the courtroom when the inquiry was begun this morning. R. P. Wardwell, a merchant, was the first witness to-day. He said that he had known Mrs. Coddington-Fellows for many years. He said that on Dec. 21, 1886, he found her in a rooming house, and talked with her. On that occasion, witness said, she showed signs of having been drinking. He said that he was asked to go out and get her some wine.

Little Girl Burned to Death in a Suffolk Street Tenement House. QUILT USED AS A LIFE NET. Children Dropped Into It from Upper Windows Through a Sheet of Flame.

When the flames were finally extinguished, Peter Ritz appeared in front of the house, half crazed because he could not find his little niece, Lizzie Yaeger. The child was then on the pavement, being cared for by Dr. Roberts, of the neighborhood hospital.

Lizzie Yaeger, four years old, was burned to death in a fire which followed an explosion in a distillery on the ground floor of the six-story tenement at 129 Suffolk street at 12 o'clock this morning. Four other people were taken to the hospital seriously injured.

EXTRA. 2 O'CLOCK. PUEBLO IS FLOOD-SWEPT.

Six Feet of Water in the Postal Telegraph Building There. THE JOURNAL WASHED OUT. Spokane Advises Say the Village of Concouella Is Destroyed. LOSS OF LIFE IS REPORTED. Flood in the Frazer River District Increases—Damage Tremendous.

At Pueblo the postal telegraph office is flooded to a depth of six feet, and the Journal has been obliged to stop work. Later—At an early hour this morning it is reported that the wires from Pueblo to all are down.

Two cloudbursts, one in the afternoon and one at about midnight, caused the inundation of the city, by swelling the Fountain and Arkansas rivers, at their junction. The electric light plants were flooded, the city being thus plunged into darkness.

After midnight there were nearly six inches of water over the Grand O'Connell stage. A number of printers and others, on the upper floors of the building, were penned in, so rapid was the rise of the waters. SPOKANE, Wash., May 31.—Word reached here last night that the town of Concouella was swept away by a flood. It is said that every business house in town was destroyed and that nearly all of the residences were swept away.

At Westminister the river wharves are submerged. Many cabins along the water front have floated off on the tide, and many poor families have lost all their belongings. Points further up the river report that the danger increases. At Nicomeen Island forty-four fine farms are entirely under water. Anacanis Island Submerged. WESTMINSTER, B. C., May 31.—The Frazer River is still rising, and the indications are that the flood will be even more disastrous than the memorable one of 1882. The river has already risen within eight inches of the high water mark of that great inundation. The whole valley is under water, the Frazer having spread out into a vast lake. The tide is now crawling up at the rate of an inch every three hours.
