

WILL CALL M'CLAVE.

Goff to Resume Examination of the Commissioner's Examination to-Morrow.

He Has Not Yet Considered the Summoning of Croker.

Belief that Son-in-Law Granger Will Be Within Reach.

When the Lexow Committee resumes its sessions again to-morrow morning it is the intention of the counsel for the Committee to go on with the examination of Police Commissioner McClave.

Chief Counsel Goff held a consultation this morning with Lawyers Jerome and Moss, at which the programme for to-morrow was mapped out.

"We propose," said Mr. Goff, "to go on in the line which has been taken up for the present, and not allow ourselves to be diverted by any side issues. It is the only way in which we can accomplish any effectual results."

Mr. McClave is not expected to go upon the stand to-morrow, and there was a suggestive twinkle of the lawyer's eyes as he alluded to the Police Commissioner's sudden indisposition of Tuesday.

"If not, will Commissioner Sheehan be a witness?"

"That remains to be seen. They will call a chance to be made out of it, and going to call Richard Croker as a witness."

"That is entirely unauthorized, and I can say right here that I have never given any one the slightest ground for such a statement. I know nothing whatever of this alleged story of ex-Alcibi Cavanaugh."

"Cavanaugh," it is said, is willing to testify with the Metropolitan Railway Company, which he had for many years, but which, as a result of unfriendly relations on the part of Mr. Granger towards Cavanaugh, the latter lost, and it went to Sammamah Hall man. Cavanaugh was a County Democrat.

"I hardly think an investigation into this matter as that would be within the province of the Committee," said Mr. Goff. "At all events I have given no consideration to the question of calling Mr. Croker, for the present at least."

Mr. Goff was asked if he had received any news of Granger. Mr. McClave's elusive ex-son-in-law.

"Not a word," replied the lawyer, "I know nothing more than I did two days ago."

"Shall you call Mr. Stillwell, of Mount Vernon, Granger's reputed counsel, as a witness?"

"No, I haven't had any communication with him at all. If the other side is so anxious to get Granger on the witness-stand again it may do something to get him here but I have had nothing to do with it. Stillwell and he has not come to me."

It is generally understood that Mr. Stillwell knows Granger, and could produce him if he wanted to at any moment. In fact he stated to reporters in the Court-House last Tuesday that it would not be hard for him to get Granger to-morrow morning.

There is some reason to believe that Mr. Stillwell may come to town with Granger to-morrow morning, and call him within easy call should it be deemed advisable to bring him to the front again.

With regard to the possible prosecution of Witness O'Keefe for perjury, a rumor to which O'Keefe has been in jail since Tuesday, Mr. Goff stated this morning that he had no objection to steps in that direction, nor had he advised the Committee to make an example of O'Keefe.

Other witnesses who might be inclined to tell one story or the other and another when they had been sworn.

TWO DEAD FROM SMALL-POX.

Seven New Cases Found, One Being in Charity Hospital.

Seven cases of small-pox were removed to North Brother Island to-day. With one exception they were from the crowded downtown portion of the city.

The sufferers were: George Roth, 377 of 520 Washington avenue; William Lear, twenty-one years old, 31 Centerville street; William W. Smith, thirty-six years old, 111 East 12th street; James J. O'Connell, fifteen months old, 212 East 12th street; Abraham Post, fifty-nine years old, 111 East 12th street.

The deaths on North Brother Island from small-pox were: Morris Lissner, forty-two years old, removed from 312 East Houston street, May 26; and William Wall, thirty-nine years old, of 20 Bowers.

The Health Department is particularly anxious about the case in the Charity Hospital. Post has been in the hospital for some time, but it is not known how he contracted the disease. There was a case of small-pox there on April 17, that caused the epidemic which has caused the present outbreak. All the patients in the hospital will be vaccinated to-day.

BANK PRESIDENT DROWNED.

Chauncey P. Williams Meets His Fate in the Adirondacks.

ALBANY, May 31.—Meagre reports from the Jerseyville tract in the Adirondacks, where the drowning of Chauncey P. Williams, President of the National Exchange Bank, of this city, and uncle of Col. Williams, Gov. Flower's private secretary.

"A boat, in which Mr. Williams had gone fishing, was capsized by the breaking of the lake, and is the only evidence of Mr. Williams' death, but as he had suffered four very severe attacks of vertigo during the past year, it is thought that an attack of that kind had resulted in the drowning. He was seventy-seven years old, and well-known in the financial world.

INJURED PLAYING BALL.

Young Mr. Fenno's Skull Fractured by a Bat.

NEWARK, N. J., May 31.—Owen Fenno, twenty-four years old, of Summit, had his skull fractured while playing baseball at that place yesterday afternoon.

Fenno was struck by a bat by accident. He was brought to this city and taken to St. Michael's Hospital.

He will probably die.

Drugged Dead at a Ball Game.

PROVIDENCE, May 31.—Joseph Perry, aged thirty-two, drugged dead while watching the game at a ball game yesterday. He had taken a large quantity of morphine and was found dead in a dressing room.

FIRE FOR FOWLS.

Was in Millers' Exposition, for not in the Exhibition to-Morrow.

he was followed by his seventeen-year-old son and his wife, Annie. The woman is quite stout, and the quilt broke under her weight as she stepped on it.

When the firemen did arrive they were not many minutes in getting ladders up to the building and rescuing the people who remained in the place.

The fire was caused by a match on either side of a struggling, fighting mass of people. A dozen women cried and begged the firemen to rescue missing friends and relatives, who, they were certain, were still in the building.

Little Lisette's Body Found.

Chief Ahearn, going through the building, found four-year-old Lisette Yeager on the third floor. She was unconscious, and lay by her side until she died shortly after being taken to the Gouverneur Hospital.

The child had been in the house only since yesterday morning. Her mother, who lives in Miller's exposition, sent her to her uncle, Per Hinz, because it was her birthday, and her uncle gave her a little doll named Lisette. Lisette had gone home last night, but was too tired, so she was put to bed.

Meyer Hinz, a forty-one years old, who lived on the third floor, tried to get out of the lower part of the face, arms and body were badly burned.

Simon Lehman, who lived on the top floor, was carried down ladders by the firemen and found by the firemen. He controlled they had burned through the entire house.

Half Crased with Fire.

When the flames were finally extinguished Peter Hinz appeared in front of the house, half crased because of the fire. The child was then on the pavement, being carried by Dr. Robinson to the Gouverneur Hospital.

Hinz looked at the mangled form, but did not say a word. He was too shocked to tell him that there was no one in the building, but he pleaded so hard that the firemen could not let him make the search.

Hinz was about to enter the building in a call from the firemen, a policeman who stood before the door and told the grief-stricken man that the firemen had nothing to say. He didn't make any difference who was burned, he could not help.

Chief Ahearn heard the cruel words of the policeman and forcibly removed him from his position in the doorway and let Hinz go upstairs. He was still searching the ruins when the child died in the hospital.

The total damage is estimated at \$15,000. In the neighborhood the burned tenement has long been considered unlucky. In a fire there two years ago Esther Goldstein and two children were burned to death.

FIRE ALARM AT A SCHOOL.

It Brought Several Engines, but There Was No Panic.

When John Meyers, twenty-two years old, of 9 Cornelia street, entered the cellar of the five-story tenement 22 Hudson street, at 2 o'clock this morning with a lighted candle in his hand, an explosion of gas ensued, and Meyers was badly injured. The firemen extinguished the flames.

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
