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SPORTING MISCELLANY.

Ramsdell, of the University of Pennsylvania, who tied the 100-yard intercollegiate record of ten seconds at the championship game, and repeated the performance at Philadelphia last Monday, was the victor in the 100-yard scratch race at the games of the New York Athletic Club at Travers Island next Saturday.

The N. Y. A. C. pins its faith to E. M. Allen in this event, who won the 75-yard handicap at the N. Y. A. C. games, Ramsdell will meet his defeat again. H. S. Patterson, who gave him such a close race for the intercollegiate 100 yards, the Harvard supporters will be disappointed.

The one-mile handicap is likely to furnish a grand race, as J. O. Jarvis and J. E. Moore, who have been in the lead in the running broad jump, E. S. Ramsdell will have as his principal competitors L. Sheldon, Yale, and N. Y. A. C., R. H. Hines, Jr., and H. A. A., and E. W. Soff, of the N. Y. A. C.

Justice McMahon Will Consider Law Regarding Theaters. Martin B. Hoffman, the chief usher of the Garden Theatre, who was arrested last night by Policeman Savage, of the West Thirtieth street station, on the complaint of Fireman Arthur Sheridan, acting under orders from Inspector Kenehan, was in Jefferson Market Police Court to-day.

Justice McMahon decided that owing to the legal technicalities of the case he would have to adjourn the case until tomorrow in order to study section 274 of the Laws of this State, which provides that no person shall be arrested without a warrant. Inspector Kenehan and Fireman Sheridan, who were represented by Daniel O'Reilly, a well-known manager of the "1022" company.

The complainants contended that under the law the theater people have no right to allow people to stand in the aisles of the orchestra seats. Although there were only thirty-five people in the orchestra, the theater people claimed that the law had been violated. Garden Theatre people take the stand that the cross-aisle at the rear of the seats has always been open, and does not come under the section mentioned, since that refers to aisles which lead to exits.
