IRONED THE BARBER'S FACE.

An Angry Chinaman Mutilates an Ugly Customer.

The Weapon Was Hot and Shambo Is Disfigured for Life.

Ling See, a laundryman, of No. 159 Greenpoint avenue, was held in the Even Street Court, Williamsburg, today, on a charge of assault.

Shambo is a barber, at No. 131 Greenpoint avenue. Last night he was very much under the influence of liquor.

He was now Lee Sing's time to wake up, and he howled at Shambo. The two made so much noise that several hundred people collected outside.

There was loud talk about lynching, but two policemen subdued the disorder and locked Lee Sing up.

DOUBLE FREEZE-OUT FOR HER

Mrs. Williams' Suit for \$5,000 Damages Thrown Out of Court.

She Said an "L" Road Porter Made Her Stay Out in the Cold.

Sarah D. Williams brought suit for \$5,000 damages in the City Court, Brooklyn, against the Kings County Elevated Railroad Company for alleged outrageous treatment by one of the Company's employees.

She charges that on the night of Jan. 30, 1905, when the temperature was one degree below zero, she was compelled to stand on the platform at the Summer avenue station for over half an hour although a light fire was burning in the waiting room.

On the witness stand today she testified that she reached the station at 12:30 A. M.

She charged that the porter, before she had recovered sufficiently to summon help, she thinks they were drunk.

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SHE SUES IBERT FOR \$5,000.

Miss Colby Says She Was Badly Hurt Through His Negligence.

Frank Ibert, the wealthy brewer, was defendant today in the City Court, Brooklyn, in a suit brought by Margaret A. Colby to recover \$5,000 damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained through the defendant's negligence.

On June 15, 1912, Miss Colby, who was then a child, was walking along Grove street in front of Ibert's property.

She says that she had been told by Michael Sherlock, the celebrated trial lawyer, that she should sue for \$5,000.

MAY HAVE A NEW CAPTAIN.

Rumor Concerning the United States Cruiser New York.

The United States cruiser New York is expected to arrive at the Brooklyn Navy-Yard either to-morrow or on Friday.

Private information from Washington has started the rumor that Capt. Theodore R. Kautz is designated by the War Department to succeed Capt. John W. Philip, as commander of the New York.

The New York, it is said, may go to Europe to relieve the fleet there.

Police Have Strong Evidence from the Women Who "Squealed."

LONG ISLAND CITY, L. I., June 6.—The Brooklyn Board of Aldermen, City Clerk Benjamin and their friends started on a junketing expedition this morning through the Brooklyn watershed.

At Hempstead the Aldermen had arranged to meet Mayor Schieren, City Works Commissioner White and other officials, when the whole party would begin the inspection of the proposed extension to Massena.

Commissioner White said this morning that the Aldermen would pay particular attention to the work which has been going on in cleaning the ponds and streams ever since "The Evening World" called the attention of the Department to the polluted condition of Brooklyn's water supply.

He stated that the report on the matter to Commissioner White, which contains such startling disclosures of contamination, is the Commissioner's report to make the report public.

He said, however, that in samples taken from a number of city houses the analyses showed that the water contained no harmful germs.

Other samples, however, showed that the water was pure.

He said Commissioner Emory, of the Health Department, has had regular analyses made of the water supplied to the residents of the city.

DOWE'S COAT AGAIN TESTED.

Inventor Stands Fire, Incessant in His Bullet-Proof Curraas.

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, June 6.—Another private test of Herr Dowe's bullet-proof coat was made at the Albemarle yesterday.

Herr Dowe himself donned the curraas and Capt. Martin fired two shots at it from a Lee-Model rifle, aiming rather low. Dowe did not appear to feel the shock perceptibly.

The glass was hardly shaken. A Times representative, who was present, says he then examined the curraas and found holes in it, but no trace of splashes. He saw that the curraas was bent both longitudinally and across.

The form of the bullets when extracted, he said led to the conclusion that they certainly had not impinged a knife edge, and probably had not touched metal of any kind. They appeared precisely like the button of a mushroom.

CAB STRIKE NEAR ITS END.

London Owners and Drivers Agree on a Mediator.
