

PREPARING FOR STATE CAMP.

Troop A Will Be the First to Go to Peekskill.

The Grounds Will Be Opened a Week from To-Day.

National Guardsmen of New York and Brooklyn are making preparations for their return at the State Camp at Peekskill, the assignments having been made in a general order by Adjt.-Gen. Porter.

The camp opens a week from to-day, June 16, and continues until Aug. 4. Gen. Louis Fitzgerald and staff, of the First Brigade, and Gen. McAuliffe and staff, of the Second Brigade, will go into camp June 16 and remain till the close of the camp. There will be one or more of the New York and Brooklyn commands in camp at all times, and the State will furnish one band till July 25.

Troop A will go to camp June 16 and remain one week. At the same time the Second, Sixth, Twelfth, Thirtieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-third, Thirtieth, Forty-second, Forty-sixth and Forty-eighth separate companies will be there.

The Ninth Regiment will go to Peekskill July 7 for a week, and will have for camp mates the Thirty-second, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-seventh and Forty-first separate companies.

The Eighth Battalion, of this city, Major Chauncey, and the Thirtieth Regiment, of Brooklyn, will camp July 11 to 21. From July 22 to Aug. 4 Brooklyn's Fourteenth Regiment will hold forth at Peekskill.

The First Battery, Capt. Wendell, is detailed to three weeks' camp duty, from June 16 to July 7, inclusive. The Second Battery, Capt. Wilson, relieving Capt. Wendell's battery for two weeks, from July 7 to 21, and Basquin's Third Battery, Brooklyn, goes into camp July 11 and remains till Aug. 4.

Commander Miller, of the Naval Reserve, has issued orders to the First Battalion to go on a week's cruise, for which a United States warship will be assigned July 21. They must prepare for rifle practice also; the officers, staff and First and Second Divisions to visit Creedmoor for practice June 19, and the chief petty officers, Third and Fourth Divisions June 21.

Seaman H. Beagrave has been appointed chief boatswain's mate.

THE BARTLETT FAILURE.

No Statement Will Be Ready Before Monday Afternoon or Later.

William W. Goddich, the auxiliary receiver for Edward B. Bartlett & Co., and the Union Warehouse Company, which assigned yesterday, has a number of accountants at work on the books of the concern, endeavoring to compile a statement of the assets and liabilities.

Mr. Goddich told an "Evening World" reporter to-day it would be impossible to get at any figures before Monday. The heaviest creditors are said to be banks, from whom Bartlett & Co. borrowed money to put into the Union Warehouse Company.

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HE CALLS FOR PATRIOTS.

A Noted Sicilian Refugee is Seeking Fighters Here.

Monteleone Says a Revolt Against the King is Ripening in Italy.

There arrived in New York two weeks ago one of the few leaders of the late Sicilian revolution who escaped Italian prisons. In the person of Prof. Antonio Monteleone, the Professor is accompanied by his wife and two tailors of Sicily, who may also be described as refugees. For the present they have taken quarters at 303 East Tenth street.

To a number of friends who sympathize with the laboring classes in Italy, the Professor stated that the object of his visit to America was to organize a Fascio dei Lavoratori, a union of labor, under the auspices of the New York section of the Socialists. The first steps in this direction will be taken to-morrow night at 6 Spring street.

Prof. Monteleone hopes ultimately to change his proposed Fascio dei Lavoratori into a band of revolutionists who will go to Sicily, and under his leadership participate in an uprising against the Italian Government, which he confidently expects will take place in about a year. He has expressed himself freely since his arrival on the Sicilian troubles.

The people, he says, are oppressed by the Italian Government, beyond the power of endurance. The loose financial policy of the Government, which has resulted in the bankruptcy of the Bank of the State Treasury, left a debt of \$100,000,000, which has been repaid by the sale of the land. The last outbreak which was a protest against taxation, was led by some of the ablest men in Sicily, members of Parliament and several professors in the University of Palermo. They were subsequently sent to prison for long terms because of their avowed sympathy with the movement. Over 200,000 men took part in the demonstration. The rebellion spread so rapidly that as a last resort the Government was forced to send for Crispi to the difficulties of the situation. But even Crispi, the Bismarck of Italy, will, in Prof. Monteleone's opinion, be unable to stem the tide which has set against the King and the present form of government.

Italy is bankrupt, he declares, and increased taxation is an absolute necessity. Increased taxation, he says, will precipitate another outbreak. It is to prepare for this expected uprising that he will seek to organize an American band of volunteers.

Prof. Monteleone was formerly connected with a college at Genoa as Professor of Languages. His escape from Italy was due mainly to the stupidity of the police, who were watching for him at the steamship pier when he walked by them without any attempt at concealment and was not recognized.

Now and then he would cast a frightened glance behind to see if he was pursued. He did this at Twenty-seventh street, and ran plump into the arms of Policeman Gilligan.

The sergeant telephoned for an ambulance, and Dr. Ferrell pronounced the man insane. On the way to the insane pavilion at Bellevue Hospital Lannigan prayed that the soul of the ambulance surgeon might be saved.

The man's brother says Lannigan has been acting strangely for several weeks.

ELECTION CONTESTED. Dakota County, Nebraska, Republican County Alleged Fraud.

Horace Diston's Boat Capsized. ELKTON, Md., June 8.—Horace Diston, of H. Diston's Sons, Philadelphia, who in the Summer months at Seaca Point in company with his wife and three other ladies, was out sailing on Thursday last on the Northeast River. When over a mile from shore the boat capsized, throwing the occupants into the water. Another boat rescued the entire party.

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IS A CORPSE AT THE MORGUE.

A Young Far Rockaway Matron Commits Suicide.

She Was Mrs. Adam Moran, Afflicted with Hopeless Inebriety.

The corpse of Mrs. Annie Moran, the young wife of Adam Moran, son of a wealthy builder of Far Rockaway, lies at the Morgue this morning, awaiting instructions from Mr. Moran.

Mrs. Moran was removed to Bellevue Hospital from 217 East Thirty-eighth street, at 10.20 P. M. yesterday, suffering from the effects of carbolic acid, taken with suicidal intent. She died in less than an hour.

The woman had been a confirmed dipsomaniac for some time. Her husband was compelled to separate from her about six months ago. He made her a reasonable weekly allowance, however, and she increased this stipend by working in a cigarette factory.

Mrs. Moran frequented the saloon of Adam Barth in Thirty-eighth street. Last night she told Barth that she intended to stop drinking. She left the saloon, and bought at a drug store nearly a pint of carbolic acid. She took a large part of it soon after, and when discovered by the neighbors was beyond medical skill.

OBJECT TO GOV. ALTGELD. Protest Against His Being Invited to College Commencement.

CHICAGO, June 9.—The invitation to Gov. Altgeld to be present at the commencement exercises of Northwestern University has raised a storm of protests from friends of the college, and the invitation may be withdrawn. Judge O. H. Horton has announced that he will not sit on the platform with the Governor, and other prominent people have declared on a similar course.

Judge Horton says that while he does not know that Gov. Altgeld is an Anarchist, the fact remains, according to the Judge, that the Governor is generally believed to be one, and is not a fit man to attend the Commencement exercises as an honored guest. The Commencement will take place at the Auditorium next Thursday.
