

TRIED TO KILL SIGNOR CRISPI.

Would-Be Assassin Fires at the Italian Premier in the Street.

PRIME MINISTER UNHARMED.

Jumps from His Carriage and Holds His Assailant for the Police

GREAT EXCITEMENT IN ROME.

Head of the Cabinet Congratulated on All Sides on His Escape.

ROME, June 15.—An attempt to assassinate Premier Crispi was made to-day.

The Premier was driving in his carriage to the Chamber of Deputies when a man suddenly drew a revolver from his pocket and fired at him.

The Premier was not wounded, and springing from his carriage he seized the would-be murderer and held him until a policeman arrived.

Great excitement prevails throughout the city, and the Premier is being congratulated on all sides upon his narrow escape.

The shooting occurred at 2.30 P. M., just as the carriage was turning from the Via Gregoriana into the Via Capocase.

The assassin, who was apparently loitering on the sidewalk, put his hand into his breast, drew a revolver, dashed into the street and almost close up to the carriage. He then lifted his revolver, took a short aim at the Premier and fired.

Deputy Pugliese, who was one of the first to reach the would-be murderer, picked up the revolver, when the prisoner was in safe hands, and handed it to the Premier, who examined it curiously and with great coolness.

When the sitting of the Chamber of Deputies opened there were cheers for the Premier, and the President arose and told the members of the attempt upon his life, severely denouncing the outrage and expressing the hope that Sig. Crispi's life would be long preserved to his country.

The remarks of the President were greeted with loud and continued applause from the members and from the people in the galleries.

The miscreant who attempted to assassinate Premier Crispi says his name is Pietro Lega, and that he is a joiner. He is a member of several Anarchist societies, and is known as "Marat."

"Marat" declares that he arrived in Rome this morning, charged with the mission to kill Premier Crispi. King Humbert has congratulated Premier Crispi on his escape.

204 MINERS WERE LOST.

Four Hundred Children Left Fatherless at Karwin.

TROPFAU, Austria, June 15.—The official estimates of the extent of the disaster caused by the explosions of the mine on Thursday night, in the coal mines at Karwin, say that 204 miners are missing, and that only twenty bodies have been recovered.

Of the miners who met their death by these explosions one hundred were married and they leave 400 children to mourn their loss.

Experts who have examined the pits declare that they were in a dangerous condition weeks ago.

TO RECOGNIZE ABDUL AZIZ.

Spain, France and England Instruct Ministers to That Effect.

TANGIER, June 15.—Mula Ismail, uncle of the new Sultan, has been appointed Khalifa of Fez.

The Governments of France, Spain and Great Britain have instructed their Ministers to recognize Abdul Aziz as Sultan of Morocco, and to ask permission to pay their respects to him at Rabat.

British Steamer Ashore.

LONDON, June 15.—The British steamer, Red Sea, bound from Pensacola and Norfolk for West Hartlepool, is stranded at the entrance of Hartlepool harbor.

She is in a bad position on the rocks with her hull badly torn. The engine-room and No. 2 hold are full of water. The cargo is being discharged. She was built at Newcastle in 1882, and is 315 tons register. Her owners are Ellis & Co. of Liverpool.

Georgia Girl Married in Paris.

FARIE, June 15.—Miss Grace Connelly, of Augusta, Ga., a niece of the Marchioness of Angles, was married to-day to Sig. Ugo Gregorini.

The marriage ceremony was first performed in a Catholic church and then in the American Church. The bride's uncle, the Marquis of Angles, gave the bride away. There were six bridesmaids.

British Soldier Dies of Plague.

HONG KONG, China, June 15.—Fifty-one additional deaths from the plague, including a British soldier, are reported.

Japanese Troops Leave Corea.

YOKOHAMA, June 15.—No further troops were sent to Corea. The Japanese troops are being withdrawn.
