Lizzie Halliday Fought Fiercely in Her Cell To-Day.

Kicked Dr. Mann and Bit at the District-Attorney.

Insanity Expert Convinced that the Woman is Shamming.

MONTICELLO, N. Y., June 21.—Lizzie Halliday's trial entered upon the fourth and last day this morning. She was taken into her cell Wednesday night worn out with the strain of the day. She fopped over on her bed after the Sheriff had made her remove her shoes and pulled a blanket up over her. She was soon asleep, but it was a restless sleep.

Van Etten, of Port Jervis; Sheriff Beecher and District-Attorney Hill entered her cell at 8.20. She was seated in her chair and was no longer chained. Sheriff Beecher made her turn her chair around and face the audience. She did so and instantly recognized Dr. Mann as the man in whose face she spat yesterday. Grabbing the first missile she could reach, she drew back to throw it, but Sheriff Beecher caught her hand and District-Attorney Hill had her by the throat. She was gently lowered into her chair, but only remained there a second.

The latter held her arms securely beside her, and Dr. Van Etten examined Lizzie's pulse, hair, flesh and eyes. She screamed at the top of her voice and struggled over the back of the chair, butting the lawyer with her head as she went, and finally lay at full length on the floor kicking, yelling, biting and hurling epithets at her captors.

Den of an Organized Gang Unearthed by the Police. Chief Murphy, of Jersey City, Bound to Stop Policy Playing. MENAGE TO HEALTH.

Thousands of Carcasses Rotting in Jersey City. Left by the Great Fire in the Abattoir. Official Say They Cannot Get Them All Out Until Saturday.

Passengers on the ferry-boats plying on the North River, especially on those running between New York and Jersey City, are loud in their complaints about the stench that are blown over the river from the decaying carcasses of the thousands of sheep and other cattle that perished in Saturday by the big fire in the New Jersey railroad stock yards. An "Evening World" reporter visited the stock yards this morning and discovered that though the stench on the river is bad it is not a marker to the stench there. Inspector Benjamin, of the Jersey City Police, who has been on the board had commenced removing the carcasses and burned dressed meat on Monday, and that 100 men had been at work with a charge of dynamite to tear the carcasses as loaded on to the tugs and into wagons, he said, the pens and alleysways they occupied are disinfected with lime and carbolic acid. "But," said Mr. Benjamin, pointing to a pile of putrid beef and mutton some twelve feet high, "disinfectants are no good here. We can only get rid of it by taking it away from the stock yard. We will give a big reward to any one who will tell us how to kill this stench. There is no object to us to effect such a blessing. There were fully 3,000 sheep perished in the fire, and the stench is so bad that it is impossible to get rid of it. It is a blessing that we are getting rid of it. I think by Saturday night all the carcasses will be removed. Until then the complainers can only grin and bear it."

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
