If there is any surrender those men will be in it who, under the party flag, give up the opportunity to help on the restoration of good city government in this city with a vengeance that capitulation. It will be treason.

There is no positive fear for President Cleveland's safety. Yet the taking of special police precautions about the Executive Mansion at the present time of unrest, and in view of the Carnot assassination, is a wise step and in keeping with public duty. It is not sign of weakness nor of apprehension. It is an indication, rather, of that certain strength which permits of calmness, foresight and discretion.

Gov. Algeid, who pardoned the Chicago Anarchists, is both to believe that the assassination of Carnot was the result of Anarchist inspiration. He says: "There may be bitter hatred felt by the Anarchists against some of the crowned heads of Europe, but there is no reason why such feeling should have been held against the President of the United States. Carnot was a man who had done nothing to offend them. The only reason for supposing that he had anything to do with reason or reasoning.

HOW AMERICANS FEEL.

Throughout the United States, and doubtless throughout the civilized world, the sorrow over the cruel death of President Carnot, like that over the assassination of the beloved Lincoln, takes the character of a personal bereavement. The general feeling is more like the grief caused by the loss of a near and dear friend than the shock occasioned by a crime affecting a whole nation.

In Lincoln's case this was, of course, comprehensible. His gentle, loving nature had given him with the American people more the character of a father than a chief magistrate. His policy, pursued in his own beautiful language, "with malice towards none, with charity for all," had secured the harmonious of strife even in the midst of war, and had made the road to peace more easy. The news of his murder was not so much a shock to the brain as a pang to the heart.

It has been the same in the case of the killing of President Carnot. The American people have grieved over the death of the man more than over the loss France has endured. The condolences sent over the cable from our Government have had in them more earnest sincerity of feeling than is ordinarily found in such expressions. Every one is truly sorry for the family of the deceased. This feeling is no doubt due to the personal character of the man. His blameless life, his earnestness, fidelity and patriotism, have endeared him to men beyond the limits of his own nation, and have secured for him a personal sympathy as well as a public respect.

It is no mere sentimentality, but a plain truth, to say that the American people weep with France over her loss, and with most deplorable bereavement.

THE COUNTRY SAFE.

President Cleveland's statement regarding the financial situation contains much that is reassuring. At the same time the fact that it is considered excellent to put it forth must be taken as an indication of the anxiety felt at Washington.

The President has a word of commendation for the New York banks for their offer of gold, and reiterated with an emphasis that parades of a hint of a bond issue if needed, the pledge and determination of the Government to protect the National credit.

His main object, however, appears to be to administer a rebuke to unscrupulous croakers, and to show by comparison that we are very much better off now than we were when the last bond issue was needed.

In the former of these objects public sentiment will be with him. In the latter the facts are clearly on his side.

In the former emergency, the stock of gold was nearly as low as now, while we had only fifteen million dollars available for the country's needs. Now we have more than fifty millions. It is not true that the payment of matured obligations is postponed. We are paying as we go. Moreover, there has been a change of nearly one hundred and twenty-eight million dollars in the hands of the banks, and exports and imports of merchandise, exclusive of gold. Up to June 1, 1894, the balance was sixty-four millions against us. This year it is sixty-two millions in our favor. Besides, we are no longer buying silver and paying for it in gold.

This is plain and intelligible, as Mr. Cleveland's explanations usually are. It may be added, too, that we are now in the end of the unpopularity and selfish obstruction of the Senate to tariff legislation. Before long the evil of unpopularity will be a thing of the past, and the general business and industries of the nation will be released from the condition of paralysis in which they have been held for so long a time.
