WITH FULL PASSENGER LISTS, A FIFTEEN-YEAR-OLD HERO.

Eight Big Ocean Liners Depart for European Ports.

John Murray Risked His Own Life to Save Jessie Sinclair's.

Lucania's Sailors Injured by Shipping Heavy Seas.

Coroners' Office Neglect Again Glaringly Manifested.

The Drowning of fourteen-year-old Ina Gunn yesterday while bathing in the Hudson River, near One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, and the subsequent removal of her body furnished another illustration of the delay and neglect that distinguishes the work of the coroner's office.

The rescue of Jessie Sinclair, of One Hundred and Forty-sixth street and Eighth avenue, a cousin of the drowned girl, has won well-deserved praise for John Murray, fifteen years old, who risked his own life to save the girl, who had unwittingly ventured beyond the limits of a "day's work."

Ina Gunn's mother lives in Chicago. Soon after the death of the girl's father, Ina came to this city to live with her cousin, Mrs. John Patterson, of 1642 Amsterdam avenue, near the Hudson River, and wanted Ina for a companion. Yesterday about noon Ina and her mother were sitting on the porch of the house, and Ina was reading a book.

The two younger girls remained near the edge of the water, clinging to the shore. The older girl, who was fifteen, and the other, who was twelve, were sitting on the porch of the house, and Ina was reading a book.

Both boys ran down to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street and saw Jessie Sinclair struggling feebly to keep up. Clinging to the edge of the water, she was being carried by the current toward the pier.

John Murray, because of his delicate health, had been carried by his mother not to venture to far into the river. Forgetting this, he rushed into the water, and swam toward the girl.

By the time John sprang into the water Jessie's cries had ceased. She was rapidly sinking, when the braver rescuer grabbed her by the hair and struck her on the forehead.

For a few seconds Ina clung to Jessie, but losing consciousness entirely, she sank. Murray, who was a strong swimmer, safely on shore. Thomas worked hard to resuscitate her.

TO PLAY WAR AT SEA.

Naval Reserves Ship on the Cruiser New York.

Regular Marines Ousted to Make Room for Them.

One of the "Land" Sailors Reported as Deserting.

The old units of Staten Island were out early this morning to see the amateur seamen of the First Naval Battalion, of the State of New York, board the cruiser New York, and the flagship San Francisco, and thus begin their annual cruise.

Last year the State's sailor boys were obliged to take their yearly practice cruise on board the old New Hampshire, but their pride triumphed over Uncle Sam's obduracy this year, and two of the crack ships of the Navy were placed at their disposal. The reserves will be required to work, however, even to the extent of performing the duties of the mainmast, sixty of whom were put aboard from the New York to make way for the amateurs.

All the reserves were present at the muster except one sailor, Hugh Devine, who, it was stated, had deserted.

At 10:20 o'clock the Navy-yard tug "Cortland" arrived with a party of thirty-five, and the reserves, with the Commander at New York, and with the Commander at San Francisco, for she was to have appeared yesterday, but did not leave the navy-yard until 10:25, however, after the "Cortland" had left.
