RECEIVER FOR HIGGINS CO.
The Big Brooklyn Soap Concern Wrecked by a Bunco Steerer.
GIVEN A \$28,000 BAD CHECK.

This Loss Stated To-Day as a Reason for Going Into Liquidation.

SWINDLER'S OTHER VICTIMS.
Lawyers, Bankers and Business Men Deceived by His Clever Schemes.

A bogus check for \$28,000 given to the Higgins Soap Company, of Brooklyn, by David Coleman in return for 289 shares of the company's stock was given as the cause for the liquidation of the company, and a request for a receiver by Albert E. Lamb, in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, this morning.

At Mr. Lamb's request Justice Bartlett appointed Joseph W. Stray, secretary of the company, as receiver.

Mr. Lamb said that about two weeks ago Coleman began negotiations for the purchase of a block of the company's stock.

"He appeared," said Mr. Lamb, "like a man of capital and reliability." He presented letters of recommendation to the officers of the company and produced a letter from the Columbia Bank of Washington, which stated that his credit was good there for \$200,000.

"About five days ago the deal was completed, and Coleman gave in payment a check for \$28,000.

"This bank will not lose anything," added Mr. James.

The Higgins Soap Company, of Brooklyn, which was started by Coleman, was not expected to return until late in the day.

Police Superintendent Campbell, of Brooklyn, has not been asked to investigate the matter.


