The gamblers seem to have the call, so far as progress is concerned. Yesterday afternoon the sheriff was seen to present one was doing an enormous amount of gambling through the medium of the six "little" tables, and the unfinished shed, which was reopened July 10. Not even a pretext is made of concealing the nature of the business carried on under the name of the "Electric Telegraph Company of Westchester."
