BOLD ROBBER IN BROADWAY.

He Struck Jeweller Newburger a Murderous Blow with Lead Pipe.

THEN DASHED FOR THE SAFE.

Newburger Pulled a Revolver and the Thief Dashed Into the Street.

TRIED TO SHOOT PURSUERS.

Captured by Citizens After a Struggle—Policeman Turned Up Later.

Edward Williams, thirty-three years old, who says he is a laborer, but who refused to give his address, was arrested this afternoon for assisting Alexander Newburger, a well-known jeweller, of 1217 Broadway. The object was robbery.

About a week ago Williams called at the jewelry store with a diamond pin, which he wanted repaired. Last Tuesday he returned and received the pin. He then gave a stud to Mr. Newburger and told him to reset it.

To-day, about 12:30 o'clock Williams called again, and Newburger told him he would require more time to do the work, as it was necessary to get a new cap, which he did not have in stock. Williams took the stud and looked at it, finally saying:

"See here, you've chipped my diamond."

Newburger thereupon subjected the gem to an examination under a magnifying-glass.

While thus occupied Williams levelled a blow at the jeweller with a piece of lead pipe carefully wrapped up in paper. Newburger was only slightly stunned by the blow and made a grab for his revolver, which lay on the work-bench beside him.

Williams dashed for the safe as soon as he had dealt the blow, but the sight of Newburger's big bulldog revolver caused a change of heart, and he dashed out into Broadway.

When opposite 1286 Broadway, Oscar Hoffman, who has a shirt store at that place, came out of his store and, seeing that Williams was pursued by several men, intercepted his flight.

"Let go of me!" yelled Williams, at the same time drawing a revolver. "I'll put a hole through you if you try to stop me."

Hoffman, unmoyed by this move, knocked the revolver out of Williams's hand and grabbed him by the collar.

At this moment Newburger's brother Sam, jumped from a Broadway car and assisted in taking Williams back to the store.

It was nearly a quarter of an hour later that Policeman Jerolomon, of the West Thirtieth street station, made his appearance and placed Williams under arrest.

Meanwhile an ambulance call had been sent in, and the surgeon who responded put several stitches in the wound made by the would-be robber's weapon.

Newburger's store has been robbed three times.

The first time was about twelve years ago, when he was a candidate for Alderman and had a store at 521 Sixth avenue. A sneak thief, on that occasion away with \$1,500 worth of goods.

Some years ago his store was again broken into by negroes, who made a \$2,500 haul.

The third robbery occurred a year or so later, when the burglars secured booty to the amount of \$6,000.

The only article Mr. Newburger recovered from all these robberies was a thirteen-carat diamond, worth \$1,000.

Newburger is one of the best starters and judges on the turf. He is a member of the Fleetwood Driving Club and of twenty other social, military and fraternal organizations. During the war he was Assistant Chief Division Quartermaster under General Sheridan.

Newburger organized the Veteran Association of the Fourth New York Cavalry, which is the only mounted and equipped veteran association in the city. He is commander of Edwin D. Morgan Post, G. A. R.

After Newburger's head was bandaged he walked around the store as if nothing had happened, and was with difficulty prevailed upon to go home.

Williams was taken to Jefferson Market Court.

He was remanded by Justice Voorhis until to-morrow morning for examination.
