Atchison Committee Wants Reinhart and McCook Removed.

Shortly after noon to-day Wall Street was surprised by the announcement that the Atchison Protective Reorganization Committee, of which Theodore W. Myers, the Chairman, has written to President King, of the Union Trust Company, trustees under the old plan, requesting him to take some action for the removal of Receivers Reinhart and McCook on the ground that they are irresponsible and unfit to hold the position or manage the business.

The statement embodied in the request of the Myers Committee for the removal of the receivers to the effect that McCook is irresponsible and unfit to hold the position of receiver, is regarded by financiers and lawyers as absurd, as his legal ability and integrity are of the highest order.

It is generally thought that in making this statement, so far as it concerns Mr. McCook, the Myers Committee is only weakening their cause, and that it is only a matter of time before the receivers will be removed.
