There was enthusiastic applause at this. Mr. Wilson proceeded to state that the House conferees had been willing to concede the tariff, except those vital items of sugar, iron and coal; that the Senate conferees had also seemed willing to concede much and held much the same views, but were apparently dominated by the knowledge that if they conceded what they themselves were willing to concede the bill could not pass and the agreement would be useless.

THE NEWS IN THE SENATE. Causes Action Halted as Relief by Men of Both Parties. WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The news that the House caucus had decided to accept the Senate amendments to the tariff bill, and that the agreement was made, was received with surprise and interest in the Senate chamber.

Mr. Wilson closed at 11:05 o'clock, having talked just an hour. It was understood, however, that he had not yielded the floor permanently, but would resume later, after his conferees associates, Messrs. Montgomery, of Michigan, and Crisp, of Georgia, had made their statements as to details. Mr. Montgomery then took the floor and substantiated what Mr. Wilson had said as to the details of the conference.

WHAT THE SENATE BILL IS. Leading Duties Fixed in the Measure That May Become a Law. WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The Senate bill, which the caucus action today (barring the Presidential veto) insures as the law of the land in place of the McKinley act, provides for the following rates of duty upon the great staples, which have been the bones of contention.
