HEAVY SHIPMENT OF FRUIT.

The Paris Carries Out Eleven Carloads of California Products.

It is an Experiment That is Watched with Much Interest.

An experimental shipment of California fruit was made by the American liner Paris which sailed this morning.

The Paris carried the largest shipment of fruit ever sent to Europe, and this, in fact, the first large shipment of California fruit.

On Aug. 4 eleven carloads of fruit left Sacramento, consigned to receivers in London, and the outcome of this experiment is looked forward to with interest.

Some dealers fear that the fruit will not stand the sea voyage, and that it will not be in marketable condition when received abroad.

The receipts of California fruit at New York during the past ten days have been larger than at any other time in the season.

From Saturday to Monday nearly seventy-five cars were received, making nearly 200 cars for ten days.

The crop of California fruit is unusually heavy this year, while on the other hand the fruit crop of the Atlantic seaboard is light on account of late frosts and drought.

This has made a very good demand for the fruit of California, and the market has been hurried forward.

The heavy arrivals are promptly cared for, and the market is in a state of equilibrium.

The street peddlers and small dealers take immense quantities of the fruit, and the prices are low, but they are higher than they were at this time last year.

BANDITS HOLD UP TRAINMEN.

Freight Cars Boarded on the Lake Shore in Indiana.

Railroaders Robbed at the Muzzles of Revolvers.

LAPORTE, Ind., Aug. 15.—An east-bound local freight on the Lake Shore was held up last night at Whiting.

The train was running at a slow rate when three men climbed aboard. Two of them, who were masked, held cocked revolvers in their hands.

The third member of the gang went through the pockets of the men and took everything of value on their persons. The men had just drawn their monthly salaries.

When the robbery had been committed the bandits dropped from the train and disappeared in the woods. The Lake Shore officials believe that an organized gang of bandits is operating on the line of the road in Indiana.

President Newell has authorized a reward of \$500 for the apprehension of the robbers.
