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COHEN FOUND AT LAST.

He Is Charged with Causing the Death of Cornelius O'Brien.

They Had Quarreled Over the Price of a Shine.

The Accused Man Held to Await the Coroner's Verdict.

Detectives of the Madison street station have finally succeeded in running down Samuel Cohen, and he was arraigned in the Essex Market Police Court to-day charged with causing the death of Cornelius O'Brien, forty-eight years old, of 61 East Broadway, on Aug. 5 last.

As told exclusively in "The Evening World" of Aug. 10, O'Brien, according to witnesses, was sitting in the boot-black's chair in front of Tommy Sheel's saloon, at the corner of Market street and East Broadway, on Sunday evening, Aug. 5. It is said that he was somewhat intoxicated.

Cohen came along, and the two men got into an argument. O'Brien, according to bystanders, got out of the chair and attempted to strike Cohen. The latter pushed him back into the chair. O'Brien returned to the onslaught, and Cohen, it is said, gave him another push and he fell, striking his head on the curbstone, fracturing his skull. O'Brien was then taken to the hospital, where he died on the following day.

Cohen, who is only eighteen years old, was arrested on the 11th inst. and was not seen again until last night, when he was arrested at 52 East Broadway, believing that the trouble was between him and Cohen.

The detectives found him in bed, and made him get up and accompany them to the elements themselves and to discern a nasty move on the part of any or all of them, having examined their notes, Cohen was called and he was locked. Elminger is not very intelligent, and his speedy capture by Sheriff Moore, is noted.
