Their Yacht Struck by a Squall While in the Lower Bay.

The mystery of the sunken yacht is cleared up. The six persons who were in the craft when it upset in the bay yesterday were all saved. The people in the party were all Brooklynites. They were Charles Ellis, and Theodore Smith, of 115 1/2 St. Nicholas street; David Andrade, of 179 De Kalb avenue; Miss Della Green, of 100 Fifth avenue; Miss Mamie Conlon, of 123 Hoyt street; and Miss Rose Darcy, living on Fourth, near Hoyt street.

They had frequently been out before and felt perfectly safe, as Andrade was considered experienced as a sailor. They engaged the sloop-rigged yacht "Jessie G. H." from George Hymas, at the foot of Forty-fifth street, Brooklyn, and started from the boat-house shortly before 11 o'clock. The money laid out was the objective point. It was somewhat equal at the time.

The yacht had reached a point some two miles off Swinburne Island when a squall struck it and the boat capsized. Andrade and Miss Green jumped clear away from the little dingy trailing behind. Smith, who could not swim, clung to the side of the boat. He was rescued by Miss Green and Miss Darcy did the same. Miss Conlon was drifting away when Smith grasped her. He was wearing a woolen dress, and he had a hard time keeping her head above water. She was frightened and he managed, however, to get one arm free and reached the rigging. Then he was able to get a good hold on the foremast.
