

DEAD OR ALIVE? HUNG? FED FOR AN ACTOR.

Relatives of Dr. Grunhut Do Not Believe Suicide Theories.

One Story is that a Former Wife Caused His Disappearance.

The Missing Man's Life Was Insured for a Large Amount.

The death or disappearance of Dr. Bernhard Grunhut from the steamship Bothnia, bound to Boston, seems to be an addition to the many instances recorded of human disappearance, which may result in the loss of two other lives.

At present there are three theories advanced to account for the doctor's disappearance, none of which has any better basis for belief than the other. These theories are suicide, accidental death by falling overboard, or voluntary disappearance.

Dr. Grunhut was forty-eight years old, a graduate of the College of the City of New York and of the College of Physicians and Surgeons. Four years ago he abandoned medical practice and became a member of the real-estate firm of Hammer, Grunhut & Co. In that venture he is said to have been very successful, and was reported to be worth \$50,000 when the firm closed up its affairs prior to Dr. Grunhut's departure for Europe and by common consent left them in the hands of Lawyer A. Stern, of 122 Bowery.

In addition to the possession of a fair fortune, Dr. Grunhut six months ago took to himself a young and handsome wife in the person of Miss Ketchum, a sister of the late Dr. C. C. C. an employee of the H. B. Clavin Company. Since the wedding, Dr. Grunhut has been living with his wife and her brother in Monroe street, Brooklyn. It is reported that he had a very previous unfortunate matrimonial experience, which culminated in the divorce suit. His first wife was a Miss Goldsmith, who secured a divorce from him, and in lieu of alimony accepted a lump sum of money from him.

It is on this circumstance that the believers in the theory of a voluntary disappearance base their argument, under the impression that the first wife may have renewed her influence over him.

The nearest living relative of Dr. Grunhut is his brother, Louis Grunhut, a lawyer at 27 West 12th street. The "Evening World" reporter said this morning: "I do not know what to make of my brother's disappearance. The theory of suicide is absolutely absurd, as he was a man who had everything to live for, wealth, a large fortune and a more than usually happy home. He was a man who was based upon sanitary principles, and there could have been no suicidal tendency. He was extremely careful of his man, and he could not well have fallen overboard."

"Do you think that he was murdered?" asked the reporter.

"I would not suggest such a thing. It is a subject on which I know nothing. Dr. Brennan, who accompanied him from the date of his sailing from Boston, June 25, said that he was a man who was subject to fits of depression and melancholy, and that he was very nervous. "Was his life insured for a large amount?" asked the reporter.

FED FOR AN ACTOR.

A Fourteen-Year-Old Harlem Girl Said to Have Been Abducted.

Left Home to See an Excursion Depart and Disappeared.

A Coney Island Performer Arrested for Enticing Her Away.

CONY ISLAND, L. I., Aug. 28.—Thomas Hannigan, twenty-four years old, an actor, of 204 Third avenue, New York, now filling an engagement in Herbert Gray's concert hall in West Brighton, was arrested this morning on the charge of abduction.

CRUISERS ON GUARD.

United States and British Men-of-War Keep Order at Bluefields.

Nicaraguans Consider All White Men Their Enemies.

Mosquito Chief Clarence Escapes to Kingston, Jamaica.

The steamship Alene, from Central America and West Indian ports, reached this port to-day and docked at the foot of Hector street. She was at Colon and Port Limon when the trouble between the residents and the Nicaraguan Government occurred, and among her passengers from Port Limon to Kingston were the Mosquito Chief Clarence and half a hundred refugees. They had escaped from Bluefields on the British cruiser Mohawk, which, in conjunction with the United States gunboat Marblehead, has been protecting the foreign residents of the Mosquito territory.

Chief Clarence and his followers were transferred to Jamaica at the expense of the British Government.

On board the Alene the Mosquito chief, a source of interest and much amusement to the other passengers, Chief Clarence, according to the story of one of the New York passengers on the ship, would strut about the saloon deck arrayed in gay attire, made up of a navy officer's trousers and an army officer's cap. He is described by the passengers as being a young man of about twenty, with a very dark skin and a pronounced negro type of face, and possessed of more than the average intelligence of the natives of the Mosquito coast.

While the U. S. cruiser Marblehead was at Port Limon with English and American refugees on board, the British cruiser Mohawk ran down the coast, chasing schooners on which were supposed to be some refugees made prisoners of war by the Nicaraguan Government. The Mohawk overhauled three coasting vessels and boarded them, but did not find any of the refugees. The men then returned to Port Limon. This was after the Nicaraguans had arrested the American and British representatives and merchants.

The refugees were transferred from the United States gunboat to the Mohawk, and were sent to Jamaica by the Alene, as the opinion of the officers and passengers of the Alene that but for the United States assistance taken by the commander of the Mohawk, the men would have been lost, as the Nicaraguan Government had offered a reward for those who opposed them in the capture of the Alene.
