A BOY SWINDLER. NINE HORSES SMOTHERED. FIRE IN FULTON STREET.

Endeavored to Get Jewelry on a Forged Check. Arrested and Then Got Away from Detectives.

Police Finally Catch Him and Say He is an Old Offender.

Although only seventeen years of age, Sebastian Lind, of 2841 Second avenue, has proven himself to be one of the coolest young swindlers that has ever fallen into the hands of the New York police.

Lind was arrested by Detective Connor of the Church street station, in the jewelry store of C. F. Price, 187 Broadway. Late in the afternoon he entered the store and presented an order purporting to have been made out by E. J. Finley, a manufacturing jeweller at 159 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

The order was written on a letter-head bearing the name of the alleged firm, and called for two 14-carat gold watch chains, weighing twenty pennyweights each. They were to be delivered to Connor.

Accompanying the order was a check on the Citizens' National Bank, which bore the date of Aug. 28, and was signed by E. J. Finley. The space for the amount was left vacant, and Lind was to fill in the amount of the purchase.

Pierce became suspicious from the fact that he had never heard of the firm and the peculiar nature of the transaction. He drew the boy's attention and detached one of his clerks to the church street station. He then told the boy to wait a few moments while he had the check examined.

When Detective Connors arrived he began questioning Lind, but he was cool and held his tongue. Connors decided to arrest the boy pending an investigation. Mr. Pierce in the mean time having ascertained that the firm did not exist at the address on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.
