DUMPING SCOWS DISABLED. Barney Company Further Halted in the Garbage Tie-Up.

Lively Hustling to Fill the Places of Strikers To-Day.

The garbage tie-up continued to-day with but little relief, and the confusion that has prevailed in the Street-Cleaning Department since the strike of the Barney boat captains and mates was apparent at all the dumping grounds.

Matters were made worse, if possible, by the disabling of several of the Barney boats. It was discovered that parts of the large iron wheels used in dumping the loads when at sea were missing.

President Booth, of the Barney Company, was endeavoring to fill the places of the missing wheels to-day, and said that some persons had thrown the missing parts overboard.

Bigamist Traced to Elizabeth, N. J., and Captured. Denied His Marriage to the First, but She Had a Certificate.

(Special to The Evening World.) ELIZABETH, N. J., Sept. 21.—George Armstrong, aged thirty-four years, an employee of the Consolidated Traction Company here, was arrested at his home, 61 Broadway, last night, charged with bigamy.

The complaint was made by Mrs. Lucy Armstrong, of Brooklyn, who, accompanied by her sister, Miss Helena Kidney, of 21 Amity street, Brooklyn, came to headquarters last night.

She swore that she was married to Armstrong Sept. 6, 1891, at St. Peter's Church, in State street, Brooklyn, by the then assistant rector, Rev. Charles S. Brown, and in proof of this she produced her marriage certificate, signed by two witnesses.

Her husband, she said, deserted her shortly afterwards, but without success, until a few days ago, when she located him in Elizabeth. She came to this place and stopped at the house of a friend until such time as she could secure evidence of his guilt.

Yesterday, with her sister, she called at the Armstrong residence during his absence and had an interview with the second wife, who told him she was married to him about two years ago. She was the widow of Charles Jones, an Elizabeth policeman.

She was taken to headquarters, where she was committed to the police. The first wife is a fine looking and well-dressed woman, and she returned to Brooklyn with her sister.




