

RIORDAN GOES FREE.

No One Appeared to Prosecute Appo's Alleged Assailant.

Policeman Coleman Says He Confessed to Cutting Himself.

Lawyer Jerome Scores the District Attorney's Office for Neglect.

Michael S. Riordan, accused of felonious assault on George Appo, then Lexow green-goods witness, was discharged by Justice Ryan in the Tombs Police Court at noon to-day.

Lawyer William Travers Jerome called the attention of the court to the fact that he appeared for Appo only in the case in which he is charged with attempted suicide.

"I have nothing to do with the charges against Riordan," said he, "and shall simply instruct Appo to decline to answer any questions which might be put to him in his trial."

The result was that Appo refused to testify, on advice of counsel, about the material facts in the case, and the defense, represented by Joe Moss, of Howe & Hummell's office, made a clean sweep.

The cases of Riordan and Appo were called together. Lawyer Jerome asked that the charges be returned against Appo be heard first, but Lawyer Moss insisted that Riordan was entitled to the first hearing.

Justice Ryan decided that the Riordan case be called, because it was unfair that he should rest under the charge of committing felony, while the Riordan case was pending.

Appo took the stand, and the Justice asked him nothing to do with this case. He is the State case entirely," replied Mr. Jerome.

Lawyer Moss then helped Appo along and drew out his story. After telling how he met Riordan and drank with him at Sam O'Connell's saloon, North River Hotel, Appo denied having visited several other saloons and said he had taken three drinks of whiskey altogether.

NO FERRY IN SIGHT.

Messrs. Starin and Carroll Are Still Out of the City.

What Will State Island Commuters Do with October Books?

Stated that the Transit Company is Reaping a Harvest.

The fact that Howard Carroll or John H. Starin has purchased the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Whitehall street to Staten Island, does not seem to have occasioned as much uneasiness among the residents of the island as the dilatory manner in which Howard Carroll goes about executing the lease, if he means to execute it at all.

There are not a few people on the island who profess to believe that hereafter there will be rival ferries in operation between New York and Staten Island.

There is to-day a practically abandoned horse-car line, which for a short distance goes more nearly through the center of the island than does the present steam railroad line which, for the greater part of its route, skirts the shore.

It is hinted that it is Mr. Carroll, or Mr. Starin's, intention to convert this horse-car line into a ferry road, and extend it from one end of the island to the other, with many radiating branches.

If this be done, instead of getting a set-back, Staten Island would, in all probability, enjoy an unprecedented boom.

But whether or not such a line will be put in operation seems to depend entirely upon Mr. Carroll or Mr. Starin, both gentlemen were expected at their offices this morning.

It is not to be expected that they will do anything to do with the ferry franchise. Neither of them, however, but in an appearance.
