SEVEN YEARS OLD TO-DAY.

"The Evening World" Completes Another Period in Its Useful Career.

MANY FRESH LAURELS WON.

Battles Against Evils Fought and Won, Wrongs Righted and Abuses Stopped.

ALL IN THE NAME OF THE PEOPLE

The Poor Aided by Several Charitable Funds and Malefactors Brought to Justice.

Just seven years ago to-day "The Evening World" made its first appearance on the streets. It was a healthy, lusty youngster, and it thrived wonderfully on the food of public opinion which was administered at its very inception.

From a modest beginning "The Evening World" has grown to such proportions that where in the first few years of its existence four pages were ample in which to record the news and events of the day, eight pages are now required for that purpose.


