A DYNAMITE FIEND'S PLOT.

Caught Just in Time to Prevent Fearful Carnage at New Rochelle.

TRIED TO KILL 100 ITALIANS.

He Had Planted Nine Cartridges Under a Workmen's Shanty Where People Slept.

WAS ARRESTED AFTER A FIGHT.

Riley Was About to Explode the Mine by Electricity When Discovered by a Watchman.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., Oct. 22.—A desperate attempt was made last night to blow up a shanty about a mile from this village and near Glen Island. Had the plot succeeded it is probable that about 100 Italians who were in the place would have been killed and great damage would have resulted to adjoining property in the neighborhood.

The Italian and Irishmen employed as laborers on the new sewer near Glen Island have had frequent encounters owing to race prejudice. About three weeks ago there was a pitched battle between them, and since then the fight has been renewed at intervals.

Patrick Riley, twenty-four years old, swore that he would be revenged for some wrong done by the Irishmen. He had planted nine cartridges under a shanty where the workmen slept. Riley, who is an expert dynamiter, put the cartridges under different parts of the shanty, and was about to explode the cartridges when he was discovered by a watchman.

A night watchman in the employ of Contractors Murray and Mulloy happened to come by, and seeing Riley, stopped to find out what he was doing. While walking by Riley had a gun pointed at him, and he was about to pull the trigger when he was arrested by the watchman.

Riley was arrested before Justice Tierney in the New Rochelle Court, and was taken to White Plains.
